Trumbull Commissioners approve economic development contract with Chamber

Trumbull County Commissioners approved a new 12-month, \$23,000 contract with the Youngstown/Warren Regional Chamber to continue its multifaceted economic development efforts in the county.

The Chamber oversees the retention and expansion of local business and attraction of new business throughout the Valley, providing a broad range of proven economic development services by assisting companies in identifying suitable properties, securing project incentives, obtaining strategic information and much more.

Sarah Boyarko, the Chamber's senior vice president of Economic Development, said, "In 2017 and year-to-date in 2018, the Regional Chamber managed 13 Trumbull County projects totaling \$97,593,414 of private company investment and the creation of 217 new jobs, with an estimated annual payroll of more than \$9,166,504. 



With school starting for Lakeview Schools on Sept. 4 we want to remind everyone on some school safety tips. Please be aware and use extra caution if you are dropping or picking up children from the high school or new K-8 building. Pay attention to other vehicle traffic as well as pedestrian traffic near the schools to help avoid any accidents. Also, remember the school zone speed limits of 20 mph during the restricted hours. Traffic patterns at the new Lakeview K-8 building will be new for everyone so please pay extra attention to markings or signage to help alleviate any issues with pick up or drop offs. Parents are asked to remind their children if they see something or hear something in the schools to say something to a teacher, administrator, or one of our school resource officers.

Lakeview Schools and the Cortland Police Dept. have entered into an agreement that added a second school resource officer (SRO) to the district. This agreement will allow an officer to be in each building without having to cover all of the districts buildings by themselves. Officer Rice has been with Cortland PD since 2003 and has been one of the department instructors. In August, Officer Rice completed a 40 hour school resource officer class in Columbus hosted by the Ohio School Resource Officer Association that covered topics including safety, school legal issues

and working with the schools and children. If you see Officer Rice in the schools or on the road feel free to ask him any questions you'd like. The goal of school resource officers is three fold. We must be Law Enforcement Officers first as well as being teachers and counselors. Officer Smith has done a great job of accomplishing that and with the addition of our second school resource officer our relationship with the community and schools will continue to grow. Our goal as school resource officers is to help the students, staff, and parents feel safe and create a safe and comfortable learning environment for our children as well as being an additional resource for the community and school district. Due to recent events in the past several years across the country school resource officers have been the topic of conversations and we are fortunate that the Lakeview School District and Cortland PD have had program in place for years.

The definition of a garden by the Miriam Webster Dictionary is a: a plot of ground where herbs, fruits or vegetables are cultivated; b: a rich well-cultivated region; c: a container (such as a window box) planted with a variety of small plants. Wikipedia defines a garden as a planned space, usually outdoors, set aside for the display, cultivation and enjoyment of plants and other forms of nature.

It then follows that a definition of gardening is the tending, growing and cultivating of plants, especially as a hobby. Gardening tends to be labor intensive, which separates it from farming and forestry. Because I garden, I appreciate the time, labor and love other gardeners invest in these plots of ground or containers, and I am always ready and willing to go visit a garden.

One way to go garden visiting is to go on a Garden Walk. Not all garden walks are alike, and that is a good thing! Another way to visit is to go on a House and Garden Tour. These are different from a garden walk. I like to think that the buildings and the gardens have their own unique story to tell. In July, John and I bought tickets for a Home and Garden Tour, and then later in the month went on a Garden Walk, both in New York State.

The Chautauqua Institution is a site of great natural beauty with historical and architectural significance. It was designated a National Landmark on June 30, 1989. There are over 200 public gardens, green space and parks located throughout the Chautauqua grounds. This popular self-guided walking tour showcases quaint cottages, well-tended gardens and tree lined streets.

The Chautauqua Bird, Tree and Garden Club was founded in 1913, and the club sponsored the first house tour in 1954. The biennial tour ticket sale proceeds continue to support the Club's many beautification projects, nature walks, lectures and conservation and education programs all free to the public. There were 14 homes, the newly refurbished Arboretum, and three special private gardens open for the tour. The tour hours were 12 to 5 p.m. Docent guided tours of public gardens started at 9 a.m. for the early birds.

It was a beautiful day, and the blue hydrangeas were perfect! So were the white Annabells. This is hydrangea heaven. Ferns, hostas, mountain laurel, rhododendrons, garden art and garden benches were prolific in the gardens. Containers filled with annuals, water features, butterfly gardens, bat gardens, Japanese styled gardens, and even a Brides garden were featured. The newly restored Arboretum was established in 1915 and features a birdbath donated by Thomas and Mina Edison. Today, all the plants and trees are identified with plant markers. A wonderful house and garden tour, close to home, too. Take Ĭ 90 east to the Westfield exit, south to Chautauqua Institute.

And then there is Garden Walk Buffalo, America's largest garden tour. Always the last weekend of July, Garden Walk Buffalo started with 29 gardens in 1995. There are now 360+ gardens open for viewing, identified with yellow banners letting walkers know the garden location is a front, back or side. Garden walk maps are available at designated locations or online. The streets with participants are listed alphabetically, then the addresses, and a short description of the gardens.

Buffalo has neighborhoods with names, Historic West Village, Symphony Circle & Kleinhans Community, Fargo Estate Neighborhood, Allentown, The Cottage District, Columbus Park/Prospect Hill and Elmwood Village. The map was color coordinated to the neighborhoods. There were five continuous loops; hop on, hop off shuttles, no charge. Tour guides on the shuttles pointed out areas of historical interest and points of architectural interest.

Most participating gardens are private, but community gardens, corporate gardens and religious institutions are also included. Buffalo Garden Walk is noncompetitive, there is no prior judging of the gardens. The mission is to create more vibrant and beautiful communities by sharing their gardens. 



Lakeview Local Schools public release for National School Lunch and **Breakfast Program-SY 2018-2019**

Lakeview Local Schools has announced its 2018-2019 program year policy for free and reduced price meals for students unable to pay the full price of meals or milk served under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast, After School Care Snack or Special Milk Program. Each school office and the central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines will be used for determining eligibility.

Children from families whose annual income is at or below the Federal Guidelines are eligible for free and reduced price meals or free milk if the school participates in the

Special Milk Program.

Application forms are being distributed to all homes in a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free and reduced-price benefits, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. A complete application is required. Households that currently receive Special Nutrition Assistance Program Benefits (SNAP, formally known as food stamps) or Ohio Works First (OWF) funds for a child must provide the child's name, the SNAP or OWF case number and signature of an adult household member on the application. Households that do not receive SNAP or OWF funds must provide the names of all household members, the last four digits of the Social Security Number of the adult signing the application or state "none" if the adult does not have a Social Security Number, the amount and source of income received by each household member, (state the monthly income) and the signature of an adult household member. If any of this information is missing, the school cannot process the application.

FREE HEALTH CARE: Families with children eligible for school meals may be aligible for free health care coverage through Medicaid and for Obio's Healthy Start

eligible for free health care coverage through Medicaid and/or Ohio's Healthy Start & Healthy Families programs. These programs include coverage for doctor visits, immunizations, physicals, prescriptions, dental, vision, mental health, substance abuse and more. Please call 1-800-324-8680 for more information or to request an application. Information can also be found on the web at http://jfs.ohio.gov/ohp/consumers/familychild.stm. Anyone who has an Ohio Medicaid card is already receiving these

The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program official. To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished is true and correct. Applications are being made in connection with the receipt of federal funds. Schools or other officials may check the information on the application at any time during the school year. Deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and federal laws.

Households will be notified of the approval or denial of benefits.

Foster children are categorically eligible for free meal benefits regardless of the

household's income. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals or milk for them, contact the school for more information.

Under the provision of the policy, Adam Hale, Chef Resident Director will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian disagrees with the decision on the application or the result of verification, the decision may be discussed with the determining official on an informal basis. If a formal appeal is desired, the household has the right to a fair hearing. A fair hearing can be requested either orally or in writing from:

The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Households may apply for benefits any time during the school year. If a household is not currently eligible and if the household size increases or income decreases because of unemployment or other reasons, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for free or reduced-price benefits if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.
In accordance with Federal civil rights law and U.S. Department of Agriculture

(USDA) civil rights regulations and policies, the USDA, its agencies, offices, and employees, and institutions participating in or administering USDA programs are prohibited from discriminating based on race, color, national origin, sex, disability, age, or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity in any program or activity conducted or funded by USDA.

Retired teachers take a tour into the future

As 30-some retired Lakeview teachers climbed into a school bus, the air was filled with excitement. Not only were they happy to see former co-workers, but they were on their way



to tour the new Pre-K to 8 building on Wakefield Drive.

When the group arrived, principals Scott Taylor (Elementary section) and Ashley Handrych (Middle School section) were the tour guides, along with Superintendent Robert Wilson who added more information along the way. "Each section of the school has a different color," explained Wilson. Safety and security are top priorities at the new building. There are two offices at the front and center of the building. Visitors are buzzed into a first section, then buzzed through the office. Cameras in all sections monitor movement.

Several of the retired teachers along with community members and current teachers took part in the initial planning for this new school. Over the years when these former teachers were in the classrooms, they had attended countless classes and seminars, and provided research and statistics on what worked in classrooms, and how teaching and learning could be improved. Over the years, elementary teachers made reading corners in their classrooms, learning stations wherever they would fit, and developed gradewide learning units and displays – all in early 20th century classrooms that worked against such collaboration.

More than one teacher exclaimed that the new school, with its open classrooms and common areas was "everything we always wanted and needed." The seats are made especially for students. No hard, uncomfortable chairs and desks. The seats and tables can be easily moved to allow students to work together or separately. There are stools that allow movement without bothering others – they can rock...or not... jiggle, or wiggle. There are tables and benches in the common areas like those in a restaurant that provide room for three or four students to work on projects together. Carpeting is large squares that can be changed when needed. The playground is fully padded for safety, with plenty of room for the younger children to run and play. Technology connects the entire school.

The return trip to the high school in the big yellow bus was even noisier as the teachers talked about the new school. As we headed toward our cars, more than one teacher remarked that this tour felt like a "Magic School Bus Trip to the Future" – a favorite elementary school book series. However, we all were busy texting and snapping photos with our cell phones, and realized the future is NOW.

The community is invited to the official dedication of this school on Sept. 14 at 5 p.m., followed by an open house until 7 p.m. Another community open house is 10 a.m. to noon, Sept. 15.

West Nile Virus confirmed in Ohio horses

Diseases spread by mosquitoes are preventable in horses with proper vaccination

The Ohio Dept. of Agriculture recently confirmed the first positive cases of West Nile Virus (WNV) in Ohio horses for 2018. Two cases in Northeast Ohio have been confirmed and the animals had not been vaccinated. The spread of WNV in horses is preventable with proper vaccination and horse owners are urged to ensure their animal's vaccine and boosters are up to

West Nile Virus is transmitted to horses via bites from infected mosquitoes. Clinical signs for WNV include flu-like symptoms, where the horse seems mildly anorexic and depressed. Changes in mentality, drowsiness, driving or pushing forward (often without control) and asymmetrical weakness may be observed. Mortality rate from WNV can be as high as 30-40 percent in horses. Infection with WNV does not always lead to signs of illness in people or animals. WNV is endemic in the United States and Ohio has reported positive cases in horses each of the last few vears. There were 14 confirmed cases of WNV in Ohio in 2017.

"My message to horse owners is simple: vaccinate your animals and you can protect against West Nile Virus," said State Veterinarian Dr. Tony Forshey. "Vaccines are a proven and effective prevention tool and I encourage all owners to talk to their veterinarian to learn how they can easily keep their animals healthy.

Ín addition to vaccinations, horse owners should work to reduce the mosquito population and eliminate possible breeding areas. Recommendations include: removing stagnant water sources; keeping animals inside during the bugs' feeding times, which are typically early in the morning and evening; and using mosquito repellents.

Is credit monitoring enough to keep your identity safe?

Identity theft can be a time-consuming and costly hassle, but there are measures you can take to protect your personal information and avoid the headache. One tool that can help is credit monitoring. But what exactly does credit monitoring do? And more importantly, is it enough to keep you safe?

What is credit monitoring? There are a three primary national consumer credit bureaus, and you may have a credit report with more than one. Although the reports are often similar, they're not necessarily identical because some financial institutions only report data to one or two of the bureaus, and some don't report data to any of them.

At their simplest, credit monitoring services will look for potentially suspicious changes in your credit reports based on your prior activity and send you an alert if they detect an issue. These could include a new hard inquiry (when you apply for credit and a creditor checks your report) or a new account. Either could be an indication that someone is using your information to fraudulently open financial accounts.

They may also alert you to new public records, such as a bankruptcy, and to changes to the personal information section, such as a new name or address on your report.

Credit monitoring services can range in price and function. You can find the basic monitoring and alert services for free. However, they may only monitor one or two of your credit reports, so you could have to sign up for several to get full coverage.

Services that have a monthly or annual subscription fee may monitor your credit reports from all three bureaus. More robust identity monitoring services include additional features, such as fraud resolution assistance, reimbursements for lost funds or expenses related to identity theft and scanning the internet for your personal information. They may alert you if your info is used to open financial accounts that aren't generally on the major three consumer credit reports, such as a bank account or payday loan.

An alert may be too late, but it can still be helpful. Credit monitoring services are reactive by nature. If you're alerted that someone has tried to use (or successfully used) your personal information, then in a sense it's too late – you're already a victim of identity theft.

However, being able to react right away can help limit the damage because you can contact the companies to have the fraudulent accounts shut down. Additionally, there are steps you can take to help minimize your risk of identity theft.

Ways to protect yourself before something happens. Unless you decide to live off the financial grid, you may not be able to completely protect yourself from large data breaches. But here are a few things you can do to help keep your personal information secure:

• Don't carry your Social Security card in your wallet, and only carry other documents with sensitive information (such as a Medicare card) when you know you'll need them.

• Generally, don't share your personal information if you receive an incoming call, even if the person claims to be from your bank or a government agency. Instead, tell the caller you will call them back and use the entity's actual number (which can usually be found on a bill, statement of account or website) to do so.

• Learn how to safely and properly dispose of computers, mobile phones and other electronics that may have your personal information on them.

• Place fraud alerts or credit freezes on your reports to make it more difficult for someone else to open an account in your name.

• Before throwing it out, shred or cut up material that has personal information, including old bank statements, credit cards and insurance forms.

• Install antivirus software on your computer and keep it up to date.

• Avoid logging into financial accounts while using public Wi-Fi networks, including those at cafes or airports.

• Set and regularly update your password for your phone and computer.

Use different, long passwords for your online accounts.

The Federal Trade Commission also has helpful articles and resources that you can explore to learn more about identity theft prevention and recovery.

Bottom line: At a minimum, having some form of free credit monitoring or making a practice of regularly checking your credit reports for suspicious changes could help you avoid major problems down the road. If you're concerned about identity theft, taking steps to secure your personal information and paying for a service that includes resolution assistance and reimbursements could be a good idea.





Taxpayers with children, other dependents should check their withholding soon

The Internal Revenue Service urges taxpayers with children and other dependents to use the withholding calculator at IRS.gov to do a "paycheck checkup." Changes made by the 2017 Tax Cuts and Jobs Act will affect 2018 returns that taxpayers will file in 2019.

The law expanded and made significant changes to the Child Tax Credit. It also suspended the deduction for personal exemptions. Parents and caregivers should do a "paycheck checkup" to determine how these changes could affect their 2018 tax situation.

The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act:

Raises the Child Tax Credit from \$1,000 to \$2,000.

• Offers the Additional Child Tax Credit for certain individuals who cannot receive the full amount of the Child Tax Credit. The Additional Child Tax Credit is up to \$1,400 of the Child Tax Credit and is refundable for each qualifying child. A refundable credit may give taxpayers a refund even if they don't owe any tax.

• Changes phase-outs for the Child Tax Credit and the Additional Child Tax Credit. These credits now begin to phase out at \$400,000 for couples and \$200,000 for singles, compared with 2017 amounts of \$110,000 for couples and \$75,000 for singles

• Adds a new credit. Dependents who can't be claimed for the Child Tax Credit may still qualify taxpayers for the Credit for Other Dependents. This is a credit of up to \$500 per qualifying person. The phase-out amounts of the Child Tax Credit apply to this credit.

Lakeview and Champion desks (and other school equipment such as chairs and teacher desks) have been cleaned, packed and sent to Panama along with boxes of books, school supplies, teaching supplies, athletic equipment and bicycles. The Department of Defense contracted with a courier to move the supplies to a port in Virginia and from there your donations will travel to a number of schools in Panama. A government group called New Horizons builds schools and clinics in Central American countries using reservists who are doing their annual two week training there. 

The psalmist of Psalm 127 says, "Unless the LORD builds a house, its builders labor over it in vain; unless the LORD watches over a city, the watchman stays alert in vain. In vain you get up early and stay up late, working hard to have enough food..." (Ps. 127:1-2a, HCSB). In inspired words that reflect Ecclesiastes, this psalm embraces the teaching that apart from the Lord all things are futile. A place where rust and moth do not corrupt. We labor for the Kingdom of God.
