It is evident by awards and achievements alone, Jake Reid has set a precedence for what it takes to be a leader, innovator, and visionary. His most recent award, as the Sporting Kansas City's President and CEO, Jake was named the Doug Hamilton Major

for 2024. This award has been given since 1996 and is a prestigious honor.

When Jake joined Sporting KC's front office as an executive in 2010 as Vice President of Sales, his dedication to growth was evident, ultimately leading him to become, at the time, the youngest President in MLS in 2016 at the age of 33. Starting from the bottom working on commission only, Jake eventually moved to working for the Charlotte Bobcats. An opportunity arose in 2008 that led Jake to the United Kingdom where he was the Ticket Sales Manager for a Football Club. Although this giant leap of faith across the pond could have resulted in a thousand different outcomes, Jake ultimately received the request to join Sporting KC in 2010 as the Vice President of Sales, bringing him and his wife, Danielle, back to the states. What started out as what could be a temporary relocation evolved into a trajectory of growth. "I'm in year fifteen of my three-year plan in Kansas City," joked Reid. And when considering where the next five to ten years could take him, Jake shared he has no plans to move on anytime soon. "I love what I'm

She would get mad if they tried to give her the rest of the shift off after the robberies, too. Go home? Why? He finally did intervene, basically to save the poor guy from a further beating. First, though, he

had to stop laughing at the sight.

Stubborn as all get out, she wanted me to meet her son. I was divorced and not interested in dating. I declined. I had to decline a few times. She was persistent. Soon Alice retired and our office moved to a nearby city. I never saw her again. But, did I mention she was stubborn?

Fast forward a few decades. I was engaged to The Curmudgeon and we were driving past my old office - now repurposed into a Dunkin Donuts, go figure. As we passed the store right beside it, Curmie asked if he ever told me about the "donut girl". Seems his marriage was on the rocks and his mother, Alice, decided to fix him up. Alice passed shortly after he divorced. However, she wasn't done with her mission quite yet.

Suddenly I had a mother-in-law that had made the decision decades earlier even though she passed before making it happen. Truly one strong and very stubborn woman!

# May 30, 1939 - A Dark Day For Cortland

May 30, 1939 was a dark day for Cortland in 1939. I have taken some excerpts from Mary Case's book "Cortland - Bazetta Remembered: Personal Reflections of Yesterday". These accounts, submitted by several residents, give a sense of the magnitude of the impact on our town from a huge fire on Main Street.

From Phyllis Payne Hake: "In 1939 Eleanor and Kenny Payne took their son David to Grandma Snow's for the day. The Paynes took off to spend the day at Lake Erie. On their return trip to Cortland, they could see a fire in the distance – but in the direction of Cortland.

The Paynes were living on the corner of Park Avenue and Main Street at the time (what is presently Village Antique and Lamp Shop). The closer they got to Cortland, the surer they felt that their home might be on fire.

When they arrived in Cortland, they discovered it was the old hotel on Main Street that was burning. Warren and Cortland Fire Departments had responded to the call and most of Main Street was gone. The livery and blacksmith shops were lost along with Mac's Clothing Store, Ennis Drug Store, Kaiser Fraizier Garage, the Tin Shop, and McConnell's grocery store."

From Dolores Fredricka "It was 1:00 P.M. when my friend and I stopped for ice cream at Isaly's on Main Street. We both were talking about how quiet Cortland was and how nothing exciting happened here. I then went to work one block away on Lattin Street at the Eastern Telephone Company (now United Telephone). I was scheduled to work from 2:00 P.M. to 8:00 P.M.

Shortly after I sat at my position at the switchboard, the call came in. A store was on fire on the south side of Main Street. The operators on duty at the time were to sound the siren - calling firemen to station, tell the first one who answered the location of the fire, and then lean out the window and give them the key to the fire truck.

The fire engulfed several businesses in a row destroying the south part of Main Street. The operators worked around the clock. We could not leave as the switchboard was lit up constantly, and calls came from all over the county. A classmate of mine who was attending the Cleveland Indians game (and lived on Main Street) said they announced over the speaker at the stadium that the town of Cortland was on fire. He hurried home.

"It was an event in my life that will never be forgotten. Operators on duty with me were Alice Hall Patrick and Lucille Thompson Rogers."

From a newspaper story from Luella King. "Tuesday, May 30, 1939 – ruins of three of Cortland's Main Street store buildings and a residence, which were consumed by flames Tuesday in one of the worst disasters in the village's history, still smoldered at noon today. Fire Chief Robert McLaughlin estimated the damage at \$75,000.

Fanned by a brisk wind, the blaze, the origin of which is not yet determined, swept a drug store operated by Lester Lowe, a tinner's shop owned by Frank Grahan, and an unclaimed freight concern operated by Max Ross. Occupants of two of four residential apartments above the store



# Just Tie a Rope to My Leg

Wherever and whenever we worship, whether at home in private or with our church, synagogue, or mosque, worship is serious stuff.

At the heart of the temple in ancient Jerusalem was a room called the "Holy of Holies." It was so sacred that only one person could enter it, the High Priest, and he but once a year on the Day of Atonement. The room was empty except for a single throne, which was itself empty. Two gold cherubim spread their wings above it, facing each other across the place where nothing was. When the High Priest entered, he had to do only one thing. He had prepared to do it for months. He was to utter the ineffable name of God, a name made up of four letters of the Hebrew alphabet, all vowels, a name no one quite knew how to pronounce. Maybe it meant "I Am Who I Am." It was said that this Name of Being was simply the sound of breathing, so when the High Priest went into the Holy of Holies maybe he just breathed.

Rabbi Lawrence Kushner who retells this story, writes: "Creation has at its center an empty throne in an empty room in which the unpronounceable Name is spoken but once a year and the sound of its name is the sound of breathing." 1 Kushner then adds a wonderful detail. Before the High Priest went in to the Holy of Holies, they tied a rope around his leg. Just in case he should faint in the presence of God, they would have a way to drag him out without going in there themselves.

There's a question that I know many of you probably ask each other after going to worship. I confess that I have asked it myself. "What did you get out of that service?" There's

nothing wrong with critiquing worship. I'm not getting defensive, but it's a backwards question. It's a backwards question because it assumes that the whole thing was for me. But worship is not really about you or me. Yes, we can be comforted and challenged by it, find inspiration and solace in it, but that is not exactly the point, not ultimately at least. In worship we turn toward Some One greater than ourselves, to The-One-Who-Is-Beyond-Me. If this old world of ours has one core problem, it is the tendency of every last one of us to see him - or herself as the center of the universe, the one around which everything revolves like the planets around the sun. Worship simply turns it around and sets it right.

Every time we darken the door, we're challenged to give ourselves over to a power greater than ourselves. When I come through the door, I am challenged to turn away from me and all my "me-stuff." When I sit in the pew, I'm pulled to recenter myself on the One Who Really Is the Center of the Universe. When I pray, I'm challenged to climb off that little throne I like to sit on and pretend to be a little "g" god. More than anything else, worship is nothing less than weekly practice at not being God. The more you practice, the better you get at it; and in the end, not being God is a very good thing. Not being God will make you and me much better human beings, much happier, healthier, maybe even smarter, human beings. But even that is not exactly the





buildings were driven to the street by the flames after saving only a portion of their belongings.

The adjacent residence, occupied by the John and Gerald Townsend families, is practically a total loss. Buildings across the street, on the north side - more than 100 feet away - which were ignited by the flames were extinguished before any great damage was done there.

Believed to have started about 3:30 P.M. in the tin shop, the flames quickly spread to the adjoining frame buildings and in less than a half hour the section was a raging inferno. Power lines melted, cutting off current in most of the village. A section of the black-top street was ruined by the intense heat."

# Medicare IRMAA Premium Adjustments For High Income Beneficiaries

Medicare Part B & Part D premiums can vary based on income. While most people will receive Medicare Part A with no premium and Medicare Part B for a standard premium, some individuals will be subject to additional premiums from the Income Related Monthly Adjustment Amount also known as IRMAA. IRMAA was first enacted in 2003 as part of the Medicare Modernization Act to address the financial hardships of Medicare. At this time, it only affected Part B premiums. In 2011 as part of the Affordable Care Act, IRMAA was expanded to include Part D premiums for prescription coverage.

The Income Related Monthly Adjustment Amount is imposed as a surcharge on Medicare Insurance Part B and Part D premiums for higher income beneficiaries. It is primarily based on your Modified Adjusted Gross Income from your tax return 2 years ago. Therefore, the 2025 premiums are based on your 2023 tax return and the premiums for 2026 will be based on the 2024 tax returns that are currently being filed. This year the additional premium amounts are assessed if your 2023 income was \$106,000 or more for an individual or married couples filing separately, and \$212,000 for couples filing jointly. For example, while most people will pay \$185 per month for 2025 an individual with a MAGI between \$106,000 and \$133,000 on their 2023 tax return will pay a Part B premium of \$259 per month for 2025 and an additional \$13.70 on the Part D premium. The part D premium adjustment is assessed on both standalone Part D Prescription drug plans

# Troopers Urge Motorists To Move Over, Slow Down

The Ohio State Highway Patrol reminds all motorists to do their part in keeping roadway workers safe by moving over a lane and slowing down when you see an emergency vehicle on the side of the road.

Over the last four years, 55 Patrol cruisers were involved in crashes while stopped on the side of the road due to drivers failing to move over and slow down. These crashes resulted in two deaths and 29 injuries to the public, as well as 16 injured troopers. Alcohol and/or drugs were a factor in 27% of "move over" crashes. Most of these types of crashes took place on interstates, unlit roadways and surfaces covered in snow, ice or slush.

"These crashes are avoidable when drivers pay attention, slow down, and move over," said Governor Mike DeWine.

Ohio's Move Over Law requires all drivers to move over to an adjacent lane when approaching any vehicle with flashing or rotating lights parked on the roadside. If moving over is not possible due to traffic, weather conditions or a second lane not being available, motorists should slow down and proceed with caution.

If you are subject to the IRMAA premium increase, you will receive a letter from Social Security with details and premium amounts. Part B premiums for Medicare Insurance are paid directly to Medicare. If you receive monthly Social Security benefits your Medicare Insurance premiums are deducted from your monthly Social Security benefit payment. If you do not receive Social Security benefits Medicare will send a statement, typically quarterly, for the premium owed or you can set up an automatic payment on the Medicare. gov website.

If you believe you have been charged the extra premiums incorrectly or if your life circumstances have changed and your income has decreased, you can appeal the decision by contacting Social Security and asking for a redetermination. Since these amounts are based on your MAGI, it may also be helpful to consult your financial advisor or tax professional to plan ahead for the next year's premium calculation.



# **Health District Warns About** Higher Levels Of Influenza A and B

The Trumbull County Combined Health District and the Warren City Health District are alerting residents of potential higher transmission levels of influenza A and B in our community. A recent report from the Ohio Department of Health Bureau of Environmental Health and Radiation Protection states there are increasing viral concentrations in wastewater at the Warren Water Pollution Control Facility, which is often indicative of eventual higher transmission, higher case counts and hospitalizations. This data serves as an early warning sign of heightened influenza activity in the community, emphasizing the need for preventative measures to protect public health.

The Trumbull County Combined Health District and the Warren City Health District use data provided through the Ohio Disease Reporting System to monitor local hospitalized influenza cases weekly. "The increase in influenza viral loads is a clear signal that flu activity is on the rise in Warren and its surrounding communities," John May, Deputy Health Commissioner of the Warren City Health District. "We urge residents to take preventative steps, such as getting vaccinated, practicing good hygiene with frequent handwashing, and staying home when sick, to help reduce the spread of illness." Influenza viruses can spread through droplets from infected individuals cough, sneezing, or talking throughout the common influenza season of early October to late March. The most effective way to prevent contracting influenza, being hospitalized due to influenza, or dying from influenza, is to receive an influenza vaccination.

Trumbull County Both the Combined Health District and the Warren City Health District offer the current influenza vaccine.




