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### Irish Beef and Beer Pot Pie

Recipe courtesy of "Cookin' Savvy" Servings: 4-6

- pound ground beef
- cup stout beer tablespoons flour
- can (15 ounces) tomato puree
- tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- tablespoon garlic powder
- cup beef broth
- bag (28 ounces) hashbrowns with pers and onions
- can (14 ounces) carrots, drained can (14 ounces) peas, drained
- salt, to taste pepper, to taste
- sheet puff pastry, thawed

Heat oven to 400 F. In large skillet or Dutch oven, brown ground beef; drain and set aside. Over medium heat, deglaze skillet with beer and whisk in flour. After thickening, whisk in tomato puree and add Worcestershire sauce. Mix in ground beef, garlic powder and beef broth. Add hashbrowns, carrots and peas. Season with salt and pepper, to taste. Simmer 20-25 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Place puff pastry sheet on cookie sheet. Beat egg and brush over pastry. Bake 10 minutes. Place hot puff pastry on top of beef mixture and serve.

### **Curbside Brush Pickup Policy 2025**

The City of Cortland Service Department will conduct branch and limb pick up service along city streets starting in April and continuing through October. Pick-up for the entire city is the week of the 4th Monday of each month. There will be one pick-up per month per household. The service day may vary during the collection week due to weather and workload. As noted below, branches should be placed at the curb no later than the Sunday prior to the collection week to ensure removal. One pass will be made on each street.

In the event of a storm, no special accommodations to these rules will be made. RULES AND REGULATIONS

- Branches and limbs need to be placed at the curb no later than the Sunday before the scheduled collection week. One pass will be made on each street.
- Only branches and limbs will be picked up (trimmed/pruned and rootfree). Not ornamental grasses or thorns
- Branches and limbs must be no longer than 8' in length and can be up to 3" in diameter.

- The city will pick up a single brush pile no larger than 8' long x 6' wide x 4' high per household.
- Do not combine piles with your

As children we learn to apologize and say sorry. It is not always easy to admit we have done something wrong, or that we have hurt someone. It may be embarrassing and may strike our pride. Yet it is important for us to apologize and say sorry. It is a humble act that shows our neighbor we care for and love them and that we want to try to do better than we did before.

In our faith life toward God and in relation to our sin we call this repentance (to turn from our sin). This week we entered the solemn season of Lent. A season that we focus on repentance and the need we have of salvation from our sin, death, and Satan. It is also a season that the Lord brings spiritual growth to His people in His Word and Sacraments (Baptism, Absolution and the Lord's Supper).

In the book of Acts the Lord reminds those who hear the words of St. Peter at the portico that in our sin we are ignorant and separated from God and He calls us back to Himself to receive what He has promised to us, the Word of God says, ""And now, brothers, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. But what God foretold by the mouth of all the prophets, that his Christ would suffer, he thus fulfilled. Repent therefore, and turn back, that your sins may be blotted out, that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord, and that he may send the Christ appointed for you, Jesus, whom

heaven must receive until the time for restoring all the things about which God spoke by the mouth of his holy prophets long ago." (Acts 3:17-21, ESV).

During this season of Lent we learn from God what it means to repent and be closer to Him. We learn what it means that He promised salvation by the prophets and that in Jesus that promise is fulfilled.

The promise of God for you is that He was sending a savior, His Son, born of the Virgin Mary, God in the Flesh, Jesus Christ to bare the sins of the World and pay what was owed with His blood on the cross by being that final sacrifice for the sins of all people. During Lent we remember our need for that forgiveness won at the cross and we repent (say sorry to God and turn from our Sin) and receive that forgiveness. In God's promise and fulfillment thereof in Jesus, with that forgiveness is always salvation, and eternal life.

So as we enter Lent and Spring together we turn to the Lord in repentance, and are forgiven and as we hear His Word and Promise and receive what He has given we grow by the faith He has given to us and we can have confidence that the ancient enemies of Sin, Death and Satan no longer hold power over us; and that in Jesus we have Forgiveness, Salvation, and Eternal Life.

God bless you in this time of repentance as you walk closer to Him this Lenten Season.

Spring will arrive soon. It is not fully here yet, but there are signs of it: Trees that spent the winter without leaves now have buds. Flowers that hid beneath the soil and snow have begun to sprout and bloom. The days are growing longer and warmer. Spring is the season of new growth and new beginnings, and soon, we will get to enjoy its beauty.

In this season of newness and growth, many of us may also be in a season of personal or spiritual growth. Our journeys into newness may be voluntary, or they may be necessary steps because of our circumstances. Either way, they are opportunities for discernment, and the coming of spring can offer us some guidance for those journeys.

First, we know that what grows in the spring was planted beforehand. Seeds that fell from trees or blew into the ground from distant dandelions did so long before we see them sprout. Like them, most of our growth is not spontaneous. If we are intentional about planting and tending new seeds and ideas, they will flourish in time, but the first growth we experience will always be rooted in what was already there.

Thus, in our discernment, we must take time to understand our past more deeply, for it will shape our new growth, even if we do not understand it.

Next, we know that spring is a time of abundant warmth, sunshine, and rain. All three are necessary for young plants. Like them, our lives are shaped by many influences: memories, lessons, circumstances, relationships, and competing visions of the future. We need this variety to flourish, but as we seek to grow in new ways, we may have to add or remove an influence. Discerning what to change is hard but necessary for us to grow successfully.

Last, as each flower sprouts and blooms, it adds to the beauty of nature - beauty that is already there. Other flowers have already bloomed or soon will. Spring does not transform only one tree or flower, but all of them. Like them, we do not face change alone. As each of us discerns how we must change and grow, countless others are also growing. If we can see ourselves as part of a larger transformation in the world, it will give us courage for the work that we need to do within ourselves.

So, as Spring arrives, may you embrace the invitation to grow however God calls you to grow, and may you rejoice in the beauty of transformation in yourself and in the world.





### Lakeview Capital Improvement Project Underway

Lakeview High School is currently in the process of replacing three rooftop HVAC units as part of an important capital improvement project that is budgeted as part of the 5 Year Facilities Plan for Lakeview High School. These upgrades will enhance climate control and energy efficiency throughout the building, ensuring a better learning environment for students and staff.

As work continues, our high school kitchen is temporarily without heat, but our dedicated staff is adapting to ensure meal service continues without disruption. We appreciate the patience and understanding of our students and staff as we complete these necessary improvements.

Grants: Lakeview Local Schools is also taking proactive steps to improve both school safety and energy efficiency through two major grant applications submitted by Superintendent Handrych. These grants, if awarded, will bring significant upgrades to our district, benefiting both students and staff.

The first grant application is for the Attorney General's School Safety Grant, requesting \$40,000 to fund wearable panic buttons for staff. These devices would provide an added layer of security, allowing for immediate communication with emergency responders in the event of a crisis.

Prioritizing the safety of our students and staff is a top concern, and this grant would enhance our emergency preparedness measures.

The second application seeks approximately \$200,000 from the Ohio Department of Development's Energy Efficiency Program to replace all existing lighting at Lakeview High School with new, energy-efficient LED lighting. This upgrade would significantly reduce energy costs and provide improved lighting for classrooms, hallways, and common areas, creating a more sustainable and well-lit learning environment.

"These grant opportunities would make a real difference for our district. Investing in safety and sustainability is essential, and we are hopeful for a positive outcome." said Handrych.

The district will provide updates as the grant review process moves forward. Stay tuned for more information on these potential improvements for Lakeview Local Schools.

### **Test Drive Your Retirement Plan**

plans Oftentimes insurance have high deductibles, co-pays and out-of-pocket fees. ### Sound The Siren On Suicide Youth Video Challenge

The Trumbull County Suicide Prevention Coalition (SPC) released its third annual Sound the Siren on Suicide Youth Video Challenge. For this year's "Sound the Siren on Suicide" Student PSA Video Contest, Trumbull County students in grades 9-12 were tasked with raising awareness on the impact of loneliness and social isolation while providing hope and strategies to increase social connection and a sense of belonging.

In Trumbull County, deaths by suicide in 2023 have doubled since 2021. In 2023, there were 32 deaths by suicide, and in 2024, we saw no change in that number. The video submissions were judged by a panel of judges from a variety of organizations and were evaluated based on content, technical elements and the creative brief written by each student team. The creative brief summarized the objective of the video and offered insight into each team's creative approach.

After careful consideration, the judges have picked the winning

videos. First place- Southington High School: Seniors, Erica Westenfelder and Colleen Castle, \$1,000 split amongst team members and \$500 for the school district to use for mental health resources. Second place- Hubbard High School: Taila Odem, Rome Odem, and Cassandra Phillips, \$750 split amongst team members and \$250 for the school district to use for mental health resources. Third place- TCTC: Austin Merriman and Antonio Sagnimenti, \$500 split amongst team members and \$150 for the school district to use for mental health resources. Honorable mention- Hubbard High School: Gianna Rotunno and Maria Rotunno, \$250 to split amongst team members and \$100 for the school district to use for mental health resources.

With the support of WFMJ and WKBN, the top three winning videos will receive free airtime on each station. The Suicide Prevention Coalition will also share the video submissions on social media and streaming networks.
