



The Bazetta Trustees and Road Department Superintendent Arnal are pleased to announce we received the Scrap Tire Grant from the Geauga - Trumbull Solid Waste Management District for 2025. The Scrap Tire drop off will be held April 1 - May 31 for township residents. Proof of residency will be required & we will accept 8 tires per resident. Drop off location is at the township Road Department located at 2211 SR 305, inside the Salt Shed M-F, 7 am - 3 pm.

City Of Cortland Curbside **Brush Pickup Policy**

The City of Cortland Service Department will conduct branch and limb pick up service along city streets starting in April and continuing through October. Pick-up for the entire city is the week of the 4th Monday of each **month**. There will be one pick-up per month per household. The service day may vary during the collection week due to weather and workload. As noted below, branches should be placed at the curb no later than the Sunday prior to collection week to ensure removal. One pass will be made on each street.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- Branches and limbs need to be placed at the curb no later than the Sunday before the scheduled collection
- One pass will be made on each street.
- Only branches and limbs will be picked up (trimmed/pruned & root-free).
- Branches and limbs must be no longer than 6' in length and can be up to 4" in diameter.
- The city will pick up a single brush pile no larger than 6' x 8' per household.

- Do not combine piles with your neighbors.
- Branches and limbs must be stacked in a straight pile with cut ends facing
- No firewood, large logs or complete trees will be picked up.



Soon It Will Be Planting Time

Soon it will be planting time. If we plan on having a garden, we have to do lots of preparing. When I think about gardening, I think about sowing & reaping.

It used to be that if you ate junk food, you got fat. Now, we have Olestra, a fat substitute, so we can eat greasy potato chips and ice cream to our heart's content without raising our cholesterol. Over the years, we've developed a multitude of artificial sweeteners - cyclamates, saccharin, aspartame - so we can drink all the sodas we want without rotting our teeth and expanding our middles. And if you do happen to eat something with actual fat or calories, you don't need to go to the gym to lose weight. Forget all the sweating and huffing and puffing. Now, you just make an appointment with your friendly local liposuctionist and for a couple of thousand dollars, he'll suck that fat right out. So in reality, what we're constantly trying to do is repeal the law of sowing and reaping.

We love game shows like "Who wants to be a millionaire?" Just answer a dozen trivia questions, and you're rich.

No years of medical school, no years of working late at the office, no years of sacrificing and saving and investing.

Now I'm not knocking game shows or saying that they are evil. But we should ask ourselves why these shows are so popular. It's the appeal of having wealth without having to earn it. It's the appeal of breaking that link between work and reward. Now, while you may be able to acquire wealth without labor, or reverse the consequences of overeating, there's at least one area of life where the law of sowing and reaping always applies.

And that's in our spiritual life. Our character, our relationship with God, our relationships with one another, these are ruled by the law of sowing and reaping. It's part of the moral fabric of the universe. "Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows. The one who sows to please his sinful nature, from that nature will reap destruction; the one who sows to please the Spirit, from the Spirit will reap eternal life. Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up." Galatians 6:7-9 (NIV)

Deuteronomy 30:19 - "I have set before you life and death..."

As a child, I would hate when mom would say "you can go play BUT BE CAREFUL!" It seemed to take the joy out of everything fun! As I got older and wiser (hopefully), the same warning was echoed to my children... FROM ME! I was reminded of this moment as I prepare for my annual kayaking trip in April, YES, I said April! This fun, yet challenging, trip has many potential hazards that can change ones life due to a moment of carelessness and inattentiveness. From the shoreline, the river can look inviting and carefree where all tour troubles can disappear (slight exaggeration). But with 'April rivers', this serene scene hides many hazards people don't consider. The water elevation is higher and faster due to the melting snow. Exposure to the frigid water that can cause hypothermia and "strainers" pinch points. Strainers are obstructions such as tree branches or even trees, that allows water to pass through but causes larger objects, such as a kayak, to flip or become pinned underwater. Every 'funspot' has a warning that we can choose to heed or ignore. Life is the same way. Every cycle of our life brings new challenges and warnings. We can face them alone or we can ease some heartaches by listening to those that have gone though it already.

So, every spring, I rely on the experience of mature kayakers that have conquered the raging river. They point out all the potential dangers in order to ensure a great time. There's another lesson that we can glean from. Men and women of the bible have shown us the potential hazards they faced because of poor choices. The warnings and 'be careful' signs are always there. The questions is, will we heed to those warning? It's a better, safer route that leads you through life hazards and brings you to a place of Joy in Christ. Don't ignore the signs, Choose wisely!



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What Lower Interest Rates Could Mean for Your Money

As inflation drifts closer to a normal range by historical economic measures, investors are closely watching the Federal Reserve to gauge their future plans for lowering interest rates. Your existing debt may be more manageable. Generally speaking, refinancing at a lower interest rate is most beneficial for large loans with 10+ year repayment period. Savings diminish when the repayment period of your refinanced loan extends beyond the length remaining on your existing loan. Likewise, accelerating your repayment schedule can cut interest costs, but can result in higher payments.

Borrowing can be more affordable. Low interest rates are especially desirable when you need to borrow money to make a large purchase. Young wage earners with long careers ahead of them can benefit by locking in low interest rates to purchase a first home, a new car, or appliances. Businesses can invest in facilities or equipment at a lower rate. Adjustable-rate loans tend to be cheaper than fixed options, but they do carry more risk as interest rates may rise in the future. If you have been considering a large expenditure, work with your advisor to determine if interest rates are at an advantageous level for borrowing.

Diversifying your savings becomes more important. When interest rates fall, the rates on traditional savings accounts and certificates of deposit tend to follow suit, and therefore, may not deliver as much in returns. You may feel less motivated to save when interest earnings are low, or may feel like you're missing out on an opportunity to maximize your savings potential. The practice of setting aside money for the future is still important for your financial security and there are other ways to save in a low-rate environment. Consider ways to diversify your savings with investment options that tend to be less affected by lower interest rates, such as stocks and bonds 1.

Financial planning can help you stay on track. You can't control interest rates, but you can control how you manage your finances. Make it a priority to create a plan for how to achieve your biggest financial goals. With sound advice and strategic saving and investing, you can make the most of any market.


showcase their engagement with cutting-edge technology while learning how to protect their digital presence.

It would mean a great deal to the students and staff of Lakeview Local Schools to have our community members attend this event to help celebrate the work and future of the school district.



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
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INSURANCE ANSWERS

Editor's note: In our continuing effort to provide our readers with interesting and valuable information we are starting a new column – Insurance answers. Each issue we will have a local Insurance agent answer some of the most commonly asked questions. We hope you find it interesting and helpful. Please remember that these are general answers. As storm season approaches, one of the most important coverages on your homeowner's insurance policy is water backup. Water backup insurance is an optional endorsement to standard homeowners, renters, or condo insurance policies. This type of damage is typically not covered by standard insurance policies, making water backup coverage a valuable addition for many people.

What does water backup insurance cover? Water backup coverage generally includes damage to the structure and

your personal property caused by water backing up from sewers or drains into your home, expenses related to water damage resulting from a sump pump failure or overflow, and costs associated with mold removal due to a covered water backup incident. It's also important to note that water backup coverage typically does not cover damage from natural flooding events, such as overflowing rivers or heavy rainfall, damage from water seeping into the home from underground sources, or damage resulting from poor maintenance or neglect of plumbing systems.

While not mandatory, water backup coverage is advisable for many policyholders, especially those with finished basements that are susceptible to water damage, homes with aging pipes that may be prone to blockages, and properties relying on sump pumps to prevent basement flooding. In addition to securing water backup insurance, homeowners can take proactive steps to minimize the risk of water damage.

Some of these include having sump pumps and plumbing systems inspected periodically to ensure they are functioning correctly, installing backwater prevention valves to stop sewer backups, and equipping sump pumps with battery backups to ensure operation during power outages. Implementing these measures can reduce the likelihood of water damage and may also positively impact insurance premiums.

Given that water damage incidents are among the most common and costly insurance claims, adding this coverage can provide significant peace of mind. The cost of adding water backup coverage varies based on individual risk factors and coverage limits.

Premiums typically range from \$50 to \$250 annually. Water backup insurance is a valuable endorsement that fills gaps left by standard homeowner's policies. It's essential to assess your property's specific needs, evaluate your home's risk factors, and consider this coverage can safeguard your property and finances against unforeseen water-related incidents. It's important to keep all this in mind and consult with an insurance agent to find the proper coverage for you.



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When Do I Need to Sign Up for Medicare?

You are eligible to receive Medicare Insurance if you are age 65 or older, under 65 with a qualifying disability, or at any age with a diagnosis of endstage renal disease or ALS. If you collect Social Security or Railroad Retirement benefits prior to turning 65 you will be automatically enrolled in Medicare and receive your Medicare card in the mail. If you are not receiving Social Security or Railroad Retirement benefits you will need to enroll in Medicare unless you or your spouse are working for an employer with 20 or more employees and have credible coverage through that employer's insurance plan.

In general, you have a sevenmonth period to sign up for Medicare Insurance. This seven-month period begins three months prior to your birthday month, includes your birthday month and ends three months after your birthday month. If you turn 65 in April, you have from January through July to enroll without penalties. If you are covered by an employer plan that is considered credible coverage with 20 or more employees on the insurance, you are NOT required to sign up for Medicare until you retire or loose that coverage. However, when you are ready to enroll in Medicare you will need to provide proof that you have had credible coverage to avoid any potential

Part A of Medicare insurance covers inpatient services such as hospital stays and skilled nursing facilities. Most people qualify for premium free Part A if you or your spouse made payroll contributions to Social Security for at least 10 years. If you or you spouse are still working with credible employer coverage with 20 or more employees, you may want to consider signing up for only Part A coverage at age 65 and delay

signing up for Part B until you leave employer coverage. In this situation the employer coverage remains the primary insurance. If your employer plan is a High Deductible Health Plan and you contribute to a Health Savings Account, you will want to avoid signing up for Medicare Part A while on the employer plan as there are income tax implications for contributing to an HSA while on Medicare Insurance.

Part B of Medicare outpatient services, durable medical equipment, preventative care, some vaccines and injections, and some home health care. There are monthly premiums associated with Part B which is why some beneficiaries will delay enrollment as long as they are on credible employer insurance with 20 or more employees. For 2025 most people will pay \$185.00 per month but this amount can vary based on income. For those with very low income and assets it may be reduced and those with higher incomes may have a higher premium due to the Income Related Monthly Adjustment Amount, IRMAA.

If you are covered under an employer plan it is a good idea to look at the costs of that plan compared to the costs of Medicare insurance. Depending on the amount of monthly premium you are responsible to contribute for the employer coverage along with the deductible and maximum out of pockets costs, Medicare Insurance may or may not be a better option. Every individual situation is different. Your insurance agent will be able to help you compare your options.

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

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


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
