## The Lake Baseball Charity Breakfast TODAY!



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

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

#### Bridge Dedication planned for

**MEMORIAL DAY** - The Cortland Veterans Memorial Committee and the City of Cortland have received state approval to dedicate the S. High Street bridge, over Walnut Run, in honor of all Cortland area veterans. The dedication ceremony will take place on Memorial Day, Monday, May 26th at 2:00 pm. on the bridge. The public is invited to attend the ceremony, and everyone is asked to bring a folding chair. All

veterans are especially welcome.

The dedication ceremony will include music by the Cortland Community Band, the posting of the colors and rifle salute by the D.A.V. Chapter11HonorGuard, special remarks by Ken David (Congressional Medal of Honor recipient), and the unveiling of the new bridge signs erected by the Cortland Service Dept.

Cortland Masonic Lodge will provide the sound equipment and help direct parking. The Cortland Police Dept. has approved the road closure on S. High St., detouring the traffic while the ceremony is held. For those who are not familiar, the bridge is located immediately South of the Main Street and High Street intersection. In case of bad weather, the ceremony will be moved to the Cortland Christian Church at 153 Grove Dr.

## **Curbside Brush Pickup Policy**

The City of Cortland Service Department will conduct branch and limb pick up service along city streets starting in April and continuing through October. Pick-up for the entire city is the week of the 4th Monday of each month. There will be one pick-up per month per household. The service day may vary during the collection week due to weather and workload. As noted below, branches should be placed at the curb no later than the Sunday prior to collection week to ensure removal. One pass will be made on each street.

**RULES AND REGULATIONS** 

• Branches and limbs need to be placed at the curb no later than the Sunday before the scheduled collection week.

• One pass will be made on each street.

• Only branches and limbs will be picked up (trimmed/pruned and root-free).

• Branches and limbs must be no longer than 6' in length and can be up to 4" in dia.

## **Training To Keep Us Safe**



Bazetta Fire Department personnel, along with several other departments will be hosting a Swift Water Rescue Class on May 30th, 31st and June 1st at the outflow of Mosquito Creek Reservoir. The instructors for this class come from South Carolina and some of our personnel trained with them last summer. The cost of this class was considerable but our personnel's training expenses are being paid through a grant we received last year so there is **no cost to our department or our personnel**.

Staying on the topic of water rescue, recently, with assistance from the Trumbull County EMA, fire department personnel from across Trumbull County has begun to form a County Water Rescue Team. This team will have trained personnel available to respond in every capacity of water rescue. This will include divers, swift water technicians, ice rescue technicians, surface water technicians, boat operators, shore support personnel and command staff.

There's been significant effort to recognize and organize this team by having meetings and working with many fire departments throughout the region. The team is in the beginning phases of determining response, procedures and training needs of all those on the team.

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


#### VBS 2025 - An Epic Australian Adventure



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## **American Legion Post 540 To Decorate** Veteran's Graves

American Legion Post 540 members will decorate veteran's graves with American flags on 19 May, 4 pm in five area cemeteries in preparation for Memorial Day. The rain date is 20 May, 4 pm. We joyfully, but somberly, have carried out this mission for over 75 years. Our purpose is to recognize our neighbors in Cortland, Bazetta and surrounding areas who have stepped forward and taken the oath of office in America's times of need.

We will start decorating veteran's graves in Hillside Cemetery which is located in Bazetta Township where Cortland City West Main Street ends on the shore of Mosquito Lake. There are over 400 veteran's graves in Hillside Cemetery dating to the Civil War. Readers may recall in July 2023 that all the flags and markers were removed by an unauthorized person. While these items were recovered, we lost the location of some graves unless the headstone had an inscription or plaque attached to it identifying that a veteran was interred therein. Through hard work we have been able to re-mark an overwhelming number of graves, but not all. Last May we found graves we had missed remarking soon after the removal

had occurred. Post 540 members will decorate graves in four other cemeteries following Hillside Cemetery.

This may be the last year Post 540 members are able to decorate veteran's graves in area cemeteries. Like other service organizations, Post 540 has experienced a severe decline in membership over the past years. Those who remain are senior citizens in their late 70's and early 80's. We surely could use some community help this year in accomplishing our mission. As always, we will leave markers and American flags at the entrance to each cemetery and near a chapel if present. Visitors should use these flags and markers to decorate any graves we miss.

In other news the three-quarter scale replica of the Vietnam Wall will be present in Warren, 29 May through 1 June, on the south lawn of Packard Music Hall. Visiting hours are 24 hours a day. The Wall bears the names of two of our own; SP4 Terrence Weant and PFC Andrew Sinchak, Jr. They gave their lives for all of us. Surely YOU can give of your time to visit them on the Wall next to Packard Music Hall 29 May through 1 June. It is the right thing to do especially if YOU are a veteran.





### **Medicare and Diabetes**

Do you have Medicare Insurance and need diabetic supplies, medication, and services? Depending on the type of supplies, medications or services Original Medicare will cover these under either Part B or Part D of your coverage. In addition, if you have a Medicare Supplement policy it may pay towards the costs that Medicare does not cover. If you have a Medicare Advantage Plan, that plan must give you at a minimum the same coverage that Original Medicare would provide, but the plan may have different rules as to where you receive supplies & services and how much it costs.

Costs can be incurred though copayments / coinsurance or deductibles. Coinsurance, also called a copayment, is an amount you may be required to pay as your share of the cost for services after you pay any deductibles. Coinsurance is usually a percentage or a set amount you are responsible to pay for the service or supplies. For example, 20% of the costs of needed supplies or a \$35 set copay for a specialist visit. A Deductible is the amount you must pay for health care or prescriptions before the plan will begin to pay.


Diabetic medications and supplies are either covered under Part B or Part D of Medicare Insurance. Generally, Part B Medical Insurance, covers diabetic supplies including self-testing

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equipment and supplies (lancets & test strips), insulin pumps and other items such as therapeutic shoes or inserts. Also covered under Part B are the medical costs associated with screening and treating diabetes along with the conditions that diabetes can cause. Medical costs can include screenings and bloodwork, self-management training, and nutrition therapy services. Other covered services could include foot exams and treatment, glaucoma tests, some vaccines and preventive (well care) doctor visits.

Medicare Part D, prescription drug coverage, covers medications associated with the treatment of diabetes that you received from a pharmacy and administer yourself. These could include Insulin for injection along with the syringes, needles, alcohol swabs and other supplies to administer insulin and anti-diabetic drugs to maintain blood sugar (glucose) levels. When choosing a Part D prescription drug plan or Part C Medicare Advantage plan, it is important to look at the costs of your specific medications and compare pricing on different plans as formulary tiers, deductibles and copays can vary from company to company and plan to plan within each company. The insulin savings program that is now in effect limits the costs you can be charged for some insulins to \$35 per month. The specific insulins that fall under this program can vary from plan to plan thus making the need to research options and plans important. Each plan whether it is a Medicare Advantage plan or Stand-Alone Prescription Drug plan can choose which insulins they will cover under the savings plan. They are not required to include all insulins. For more information visit Medicare. gov or speak with your insurance agent. Your insurance agent should be able to explain the benefits and coverages associated with your policy and compare options in your local area to find the best option for your specific situation.

## **USDA Conducting Vaccine Drops To Combat Wildlife**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture Wildlife Services, (USDA) in collaboration with the Ohio Department of Health and county health departments, will distribute oral rabies vaccine (ORV) baits targeting wildlife throughout this month. The sweet smell of the ORV baits attracts targeted wild animals, such as

will distribute baits on the ground in Ashtabula, Belle Vista, Conneaut, Edgewood, Hubbard, Salem, Warren and Youngstown.

Rabies is caused by a virus that infects the central nervous system in mammals and represents a serious public health concern. If exposures to the virus are not treated it is almost always fatal. Costs associated with detection, prevention and control of rabies exceed \$600 million annually in the U.S. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, about 90 percent of reported rabies cases in the U.S. are in wildlife. People are urged not to contact, or feed wildlife and to keep all pet rabies vaccinations current. As part of the USDA National Rabies Management Program, oral rabies vaccine (ORV) baits have been distributed through aerial drops and by hand in portions of the state since 1997 in partnership with state and local public health agencies and others. The program seeks to create a barrier and prevent the westward spread of the raccoon variant of rabies. The program in eastern Ohio will be repeated in August.



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raccoons, who eat the baits and are then vaccinated against rabies.

The ORV bait distribution program is part of management activities to prevent the westward movement of the rabies virus most often spread by raccoons. ORV baits are distributed using small airplanes and helicopters from the air and vehicles on the ground. Throughout the month of May, approximately 744,300 ORV baits will be distributed in eastern Ohio and western Pennsylvania, including almost 300,000 baits in Ohio.

Spring ORV baiting in Ohio will include portions of Ashtabula, Columbiana, Mahoning and Trumbull counties. Residents in these counties may expect to see low-flying airplanes or helicopters from May 12-24th distributing the baits. Throughout the entire month, slow moving vehicles

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

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#### The Tour of Honor

The Tour of Honor (TOH) returns for its 15th season in 2025, offering a unique, self-guided motorcycle tour that pays tribute to America's military veterans and first responders. From April 1 through October 31, riders will explore memorials across all 50 states.

Founded in 2010 by brothers Steve and Dave Brooks of Boise, Idaho, Tour of Honor invites riders to visit 4 to 7 memorials in each state. Proceeds benefit the Fisher House Foundation, Tunnel to Towers Foundation and Gold Star Family Memorial Foundation.

"The mission is to honor American heroes — mostly military Veterans but also First Responders — by visiting sites paying tribute to them," said Steve Brooks, co-founder of Tour of Honor. "It's a unique way to combine a love of riding with a love of country."

One of the sites on Ohio's 2025 route is the "First Flight Lunar Module location in Warren, a tribute to astronaut Neil Armstrong, the first man to walk on the moon. The Armstrong family lived in Champion Township when Neil Armstrong made his first airplane flight at Warren Airways Airport, located on the very site of this memorial. Moved by Armstrong's achievements, local citizens created a dedicated lunar module replica to honor his impact on the world and his local connection to the Trumbull County community.

The site also recognizes another local space trailblazer, Dr. Ronald Parise, an often-unsung hero of the U.S. space program. Parise, a Warren native and 1969 graduate of Western Reserve High School – the same year Armstrong took his legendary moonwalk – was deeply inspired by Armstrong's achievement. He turned his childhood dream into reality, flying aboard NASA space shuttles Columbia (1990) and Endeavour (1995). A true innovator, Parise contributed significantly to spaceflight communications. One of his experiments – focused on Internet communications equipment – was aboard the Columbia when it was tragically lost during re-entry in 2003.

"We're proud to welcome Tour of Honor riders to Trumbull County," said Beth Kotwis Carmichael, Executive Director of Trumbull County Tourism. "The First Flight Lunar Module site is more than just a tribute to Neil Armstrong — it's a celebration of the local spirit that helped launch dreams into space. Honoring both Armstrong and Dr. Ronald Parise at this site connects the heart of our community to the legacy of American innovation and service."

The 2025 TOH also includes six other sites in Ohio, including Cincinnati, Cleveland, Harrison, Rockford, South Lebanon, and Westerville.

Registration is open at www. TourofHonor.com. For \$125, riders receive a laminated flag, patches, stickers, and access to the seasonlong scoring system. \$25 from each registration is donated to the rider's selected charity among the event's three beneficiaries.

It is planned to be a permanent display of rotating art panels. The rotation time frame is TBD.



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#### A Brief History of Cortland

Cortland, Ohio, located in Trumbull County, has a rich history rooted in the early development of the Connecticut Western Reserve. ## Senior Watch Program

Did you know that Bazetta Fire Department has a "Senior Watch Program"? This program is focused on assisting Bazetta Township seniors in a variety of ways. One of the most important services we provide in conjunction with The American Red Cross's "Sound the Alarm Campaign" is providing and installing up to (3) brand new smoke detectors in any Bazetta resident's home that needs them throughout the township. Smoke detectors save lives and we could not ask for a better partner than the American Red Cross.

There is no cost for the detectors or the installation by our personnel. As a reminder for this program, Bazetta firefighters are the only individuals permitted to install these Red Cross sponsored smoke detectors. We are not permitted to give detectors to install. The American Red Cross requires our personnel to install the smoke detectors to ensure that they are installed properly, to test their function, to educate residents about fire safety and answer any questions they may have. The Red Cross will also provide bed shaker style alarms for those that are hearing or visually impaired upon request. This truly is a phenomenal resource available that has no expense to our residents.

Additionally pertaining to the senior watch program, we have received some terrific donations from our community's members, businesses and organizations in the form of residential lock boxes. Most recently, the Bazetta Cortland Optimist Club donated 20 of these lock boxes. These boxes are installed on the exterior of a home by firefighters and are secured with a 4-digit code of a resident's choosing. These secure lock boxes can hold up to 5 keys for any home. In the event of an emergency, fire department responders can access this lock box and keys to enter a home to help a person in distress that can't open a locked door themselves. By having keys accessible only to Bazetta personnel, this prevents any type of forced entry that could potentially cause damage to a home. In the event we run out of these donated lock boxes, they can be purchased at most home improvement or hardware stores. Currently we have several on hand. Interested residents simply need to call the fire department to request one.




