My good friend is ecstatic Listening to our favorite holiday songs can be especially beneficial during what can be a busy, stressful time, of travel and gift buying, baking and stretching our resources thin. People in Western countries often use music to selfsoothe. Christmas music tends to evoke feelings of nostalgia and happiness in many people. Its popularity can also be attributed to the 'exposure effect'. It has been proven in research that the more often we hear a song the more likely we are to love it. Predictability is satisfying to our brains. Studies have shown that Christmas music boosts the body's immune system and reduces blood pressure, heart rate, and cortisol levels, thereby reducing stress. The nostalgia you feel listening to your favorite Christmas tune has a pleasant neurological effect as well, in which the brain's pleasure circuit is stimulated, releasing dopamine and serotonin (the "feel good" chemicals). There's something about "that Christmas feeling" that words can't describe, but Christmas music captures. The feeling associated with the season -

a feeling of warmth, love, and joy - helps us to deal with the early darkness and the (often) gray, cold skies of December.

The earliest known carol was written in 129 AD, and entitled, "Angels Hymn". The word carol actually means a dance or a song of praise and joy. Carols used to be written and sung during all four seasons, but only the tradition of singing them at Christmas has continued to this day. Most Christmas music is written in a major key. Major keys tend to be happier and more upbeat which of course is perfect when you want to evoke happy memories! Interesting trivia can be found Christmas music. For regarding example, "Silent Night" actually inspired a short truce during World War I. On Christmas Eve 1914, British troops spotted Christmas trees on the German side, and later heard German soldiers singing "Stille Nacht" around them (the original version of the carol). British soldiers then started singing the English lyrics so that the Germans could hear them. German and British soldiers

then gathered together to celebrate Christmas! Christmas carols created peace then, as they continue to! Happy Holidays!

Free Little Art Galleries **Open Across Cortland**

A new, interactive way to enjoy art is popping up across Northeast Ohio! Free Little Art Galleries, or FLAGs, are standalone structures that showcase art and media pieces in a collaborative way, similar to the Little Free Libraries that invite community members to take and share a book. Instead of books, FLAGs showcase small artworks, photos, letters, ceramics, yarn works, or even poetry. Visitors are encouraged to take the art/media item on display and leave another unique contribution in its place.

The FLAG movement is a national effort that started with a Seattlebased family who wanted to safely communicate with their mother who was undergoing chemotherapy treatments during the COVID-19 pandemic. Their hope was to shed a little light and levity during a difficult time, by launching a Free Little Art Gallery (FLAG) in their community. They believed that anyone could do art, and anyone could own art. Within the first 30 days of opening the inaugural FLAG, roughly 90 pieces from various people came and went. Since 2020, an estimated 400 additional FLAGs have been assembled across the country.



"Free Little Art Galleries are a way to build community, give young and old a place to display their work, and spread good news," explained Denise Rubano, Ohio Living Lake Vista independent housing manager and event coordinator. Rubano championed the addition of five permanent FLAGs in the Cortland area, which were funded by donations from the Ohio Living Foundation.

"We worked with a local construction company, Christopher Milo Construction, to build four FLAGs, and one of our Ohio Living Lake Vista residents also built a fifth one," continued Rubano. "Since late October 2023, we've seen strong participation from the community, and I check on all the locations each week to be sure they aren't empty. So far, I have observed an array of items, including jewelry, artwork and even ornaments being left in the FLAGs."

The five Cortland area FLAGs are located outside of Lakeview High School, Ohio Living Lake Vista, Cortland Public Library, Fowler General Store, and inside of Cortland Nutrition. Rubano hopes to expand the initiative with additional locations in the years to come.

"To me, this is a little something that makes someone smile in this world today," Rubano added. "I love that FLAGs provide an expressive means for communication and a platform for people to express themselves by making and displaying their art."

Medicare's Annual Enrollment Period (AEP) Is Over, Now What?

Medicare's Annual Enrollment on your new card.

Period ended December 7. If you made changes to your plan, you should have received detailed plan information for your new plan and new insurance cards prior to the end of the year. If you did not switch plans, you should have received a summary of any changes the insurance company made to your current plan. Most plan changes during the Medicare Annual Enrollment Period will take effect on January 1. You will need to update your information with your medical providers and pharmacies. If you fill prescriptions through a mail order pharmacy, you will probably need to contact your physician or provider to obtain a new 90-day prescription to provide to the new mail order company. If you fill your prescriptions at a local pharmacy, you will simply need to provide them with the new card to update their billing information. You can contact your agent if there are issues or surprises with your coverage that you were not aware of or if you have any questions concerning what your plan does or does not cover. You can

If there are changes to your personal circumstances throughout the year it is a good idea to review your plan and coverage with your agent. For example, if you move to a different county or state you will need to change to a plan offered in that area. If your income decreases, you may become eligible for help covering some medical or prescription costs.

Conversely, if your income increases you may become subject to IRMAA, the income related monthly adjustment amount. IRMAA is an increase on your Part B and Part D premiums if your modified adjusted gross income from your tax return is above a certain amount. For 2023 the amount is \$194,000 married couples who file a joint return and \$97,000 for individuals and married couples who file separately based on your 2021 income tax return.






thought that I would want to go back to court, but after all we got to see and hear, I want to go back every day!"

So we begin here, with our first neighbor spotlights. Meet Liz Paster.



The city's Downtown Revitalization Project is included in Eastgate **Regional Council of Governments** Appalachian Community Grant Program Application - The city received word this week that our Downtown Revitalization project called Walk to the Waterfront has been included in Eastgate Regional Council of Governments Appalachian Community Grant Program Application through the Ohio Department of Development (ODOD) for a portion of \$450 million. This is big! This is a competitive grant with various worthwhile projects being evaluated. Our portion of the grant application was completed with the assistance of procured planners from Environmental Design Group at no cost to the city! The city's request was for \$1.13 million. Eastgate will submit their entire application to ODOD by December 8, 2023. Hopefully, we will know by the first quarter of 2024 if Eastgate will receive full funding.

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


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401(K) Limit Increases To \$23,000 For 2024 IRA Limit Rises To \$7,000

The contribution limit for employees who participate in 401(k), 403(b), and most 457 plans, as well as the federal government's Thrift Savings Plan is increased to \$23,000, up from \$22,500.

The limit on annual contributions to an IRA increased to \$7,000, up from \$6,500. The IRA catch up contribution limit for individuals aged 50 and over was amended under the SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022 (SECURE 2.0) to include an annual cost of living adjustment but remains \$1,000 for 2024.

The catch-up contribution limit for employees aged 50 and over who participate in 401(k), 403(b), and most 457 plans, as well as the federal government's Thrift Savings Plan remains \$7,500 for 2024. Therefore, participants in 401(k), 403(b), and most 457 plans, as well as the federal government's Thrift Savings Plan who are 50 and older can contribute up to \$30,500, starting in 2024. The catch-up contribution limit for employees 50 and over who participate in SIMPLE plans remains \$3,500 for 2024.

The income ranges for determining deductible eligibility to make contributions to traditional Individual Retirement Arrangements (IRAs), to contribute to Roth IRAs, and to claim the Saver's Credit all increased for 2024. Taxpayers can deduct contributions to a traditional IRA if they meet certain conditions. If during the year either the taxpayer or the taxpayer's spouse was covered by a retirement plan at work, the deduction may be reduced, or phased out, until it is eliminated, depending on filing status and income. (If neither the taxpayer nor the spouse is covered by a retirement plan at work, the phase-outs of the deduction do not apply.)

Here are the phase out ranges for 2024:

• For single taxpayers covered by a workplace retirement plan, the phaseout range is increased to between \$77,000 and \$87,000, up from between \$73,000 and \$83,000.

• For married couples filing jointly, if the spouse making the IRA contribution is covered by a workplace retirement plan, the phase-out range is increased to between \$123,000 and \$143,000, up from IRS.gov. between \$116,000 and \$136,000. covered by a workplace retirement plan and is married to someone who is covered, the phase-out range is increased to between \$230,000 and

\$240,000, up from between \$218,000 and \$228,000.

• For a married individual filing a separate return who is covered by a workplace retirement plan, the phaseout range is not subject to an annual cost-of-living adjustment and remains between \$0 and \$10,000.

The income phase-out range for taxpayers making contributions to a Roth IRA is increased to between \$146,000 and \$161,000 for singles and heads of household, up from between \$138,000 and \$153,000. For married couples filing jointly, the income phase-out range is increased to between \$230,000 and \$240,000, up from between \$218,000 and \$228,000. The phase-out range for a married individual filing a separate return who makes contributions to a Roth IRA is not subject to an annual cost-of-living adjustment and remains between \$0 and \$10,000.

The income limit for the Saver's Credit (also known as the Retirement Savings Contributions Credit) for low- and moderate-income workers is \$76,500 for married couples filing jointly, up from \$73,000; \$57,375 for heads of household, up from \$54,750; and \$38,250 for singles and married individuals filing separately, up from \$36,500.

The amount individuals can contribute to their SIMPLE retirement accounts is increased to \$16,000, up from \$15,500.

Additional changes made under SECURE 2.0 are as follows:

• The limitation on premiums paid with respect to a qualifying longevity annuity contract to \$200,000. For 2024, this limitation remains \$200,000.

• Added an adjustment to the deductible limit on charitable distributions. For 2024, this limitation is increased to \$105,000, up from \$100,000.

• Added a deductible limit for a onetime election to treat a distribution from an individual retirement account made directly by the trustee to a splitinterest entity. For 2024, this limitation is increased to \$53,000, up from \$50,000. Details on these and other retirementrelated cost-of-living adjustments for 2024 are in Notice 2023-75, available on Jennifer J.
