## United "4" Kids Program to Bring Support to Students at Lakeview K-7

On January 8th, United Way of Trumbull County attended Lakeview's Board of Education meeting to officially announce their partnership with United "4" Kids through a United Way of Trumbull County program made possible with ARPA funds provided by the Trumbull County Commissioners.

The pilot program will be introduced in Lakeview's Elementary and Middle Schools in late February. It will provide wrap-around services, including an academic assistance center with tutoring and social-emotional support to students who do not qualify for existing resources. In addition, a small portion of the program includes STEM and career readiness experiences. The maximum award for the grant is \$180,000 and will span 2.5 years.

The partnership came naturally to United Way, with a long history of supporting students through a range of programs to aid in improving childhood literacy and removing barriers that keep children from learning.

"We are thrilled to be able to partner with Lakeview Local Schools with our United "4" Kids initiative with the funds made possible by the Trumbull County Commissioners. Today's students are faced with different circumstances than previous generations," stated Christine Cope, President/CEO at UWTC.

Piloting this type of program will give us {UWTC} the needed structure



However, scientists conducted MRIs on dogs and found that dogs have oxytocin spikes (the love hormone) when they had prolonged eye contact with their owners, which is interesting because eye contact is an aggressive act amongst dogs and they seem to have evolved to make an exception for us. Researchers further found

that the brains of dogs and humans respond to sounds laughing and crying in similar ways, and both respond with comforting behaviors (like hugging/ nuzzling, or snuggling). Dogs are also able to sense distress in their owners through subtle changes in their scent. They then know their owners are in need of extra comforting and the dog



## **Medicare IRMAA Premium Adjustments** For High Income Beneficiaries

Medicare premiums can vary based on income. While most people will receive Medicare Part A for no cost and Medicare Part B for a standard premium, some individuals will be subject to additional premiums from the Income Related Monthly Adjustment Amount also known as IRMAA. IRMAA was first enacted in 2003 as part of the Medicare Modernization Act to address the financial hardships of Medicare. At this time, it only affected Part B premiums. In 2011 as part of the Affordable Care Act, IRMAA was expanded to include Part D premiums for prescription coverage.

The Income Related Monthly Adjustment Amount is imposed as a surcharge on Medicare Insurance Part B and Part D premiums for higher income beneficiaries. It is based on your Modified Adjusted Gross Income from your tax return 2 years ago. Therefore, the 2024 premiums are based on your 2022 tax return and the premiums for 2025 will be based on the 2023 tax returns that are currently being filed. This year the additional premium amounts are assessed if your 2022 income was \$103,000 or more for an individual or married couples filing separately, and \$206,000 for couples filing jointly. For example, while most will pay \$174.70 per month for 2024 an individual with a MAGI between \$103,000 and \$129,000 on their 2022 tax return will pay a Part B premium of \$244.60 per month for 2024 and an additional \$12.90 on the Part D premium. The part D premium adjustment is assessed on both standalone Part D Prescription drug plans and Part C Medicare Advantage Plans. A complete table showing the different Part B and Part D premium levels can be found at Medicare.gov.

If you are subject to the IRMAA premium increase, you will receive a letter from Social Security with details and premium amounts. Part B premiums for Medicare Insurance are paid directly to Medicare. If you receive monthly Social Security benefits your Medicare Insurance premiums are deducted from your monthly Social Security benefit payment. If you do not receive Social Security benefits Medicare will send a statement, typically quarterly, for the premium owed or you can set up an automatic payment on the Medicare. gov website.

If you believe you have been charged the extra premiums incorrectly or if your life circumstances have changed and your income has decreased, you can appeal the decision by contacting Social Security and asking for a redetermination. Since these amounts are based on your MAGI, it may also be helpful to consult your financial advisor or tax professional to plan ahead for the next years premium calculation.

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## Trumbull County Board Of Health Opens In Cortland

The Trumbull County Board of Health moved into the former Cortland Bank Building to better serve the needs of all county residents. There was an open house on January 24 attended by about 100 people who toured the building and met employees and staff of the department.

The facility has 2 levels, as well as a basement. The main level is approximately 18 thousand square feet, with 36 office and cubicle spaces. It has a waiting area at the main entrance for clients receiving any nursing or environmental services, as well as an

examination room and vaccine room. It also has 4 meeting rooms of various sizes that will serve multiple purposes during times of emergencies. There is a primary staff training room that will also be used to hold media press conferences during a health emergency. The basement houses a large kitchen for the staff lunches and an incident command center to plan and carry out various initiatives during an event to better control the situation. It also has many areas to store supplies and files. The 2nd floor has approximately 6,000 square feet that houses a large climatecontrolled room for electronics, such as their server. The remaining area is not currently in use, but they hope to house the county's 911 Center in the near

They began the process of looking for alternate space for the health district nearly 2 years ago as the number of personnel was expanded during the COVID pandemic. They soon outgrew the building they were in and it began to impact the number of grants we sought to obtain. This was impacting the ability to bring in additional programs to our county to improve health outcomes. This new facility has plenty of room for continued growth, and they are already seeking new grant opportunities in the areas of maternal and child health, addiction services, as well as reproductive health, which are all items identified in the current Community Health Assessment as a top priority to address. In short, this facility will allow them to better deliver quality services and carry out the mission of the organization to protect and promote the health of our county and to prevent disease.

Lastly, I would like to thank Mayor Petrosky for welcoming us to this facility and to the City of Cortland. Mayor Petrosky's and city council's kindness did not go unnoticed by staff or myself and it was much appreciated.

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

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


Another added bonus is the fun of cooking over an open fire and hiking the trails to check off the list on the scavenger hunt.

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


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It may be cold outside, but we are just warming up to one of our newest columns. In case you've missed our prior issues, our goal is to bring the spotlight to individuals in our community.

issue is about adopting senior pets. I recently overheard a conversation between a couple in their 80's about not wanting to adopt an "old" pet. They left the shelter with an 8-week old kitten that day. I thought to myself, "If Seniors can't even value Seniors, then who will?"

The problem - Our society is notorious for devaluing both humans and animals that are older. Some shelters, like Angels for Animals (Canfield), euthanize senior animals surrendered to the shelter before ever giving them a chance at adoption. What do these actions say about how we view seniors?

I'm a strong believer that an animal should never be euthanized for anything other than suffering beyond help. But I also believe that older people and animals have just as much value as young people and animals. Unfortunately, if people continue to place more value and importance on youth, senior pets will continue to be overlooked and even killed for being born "too long ago."

What is a senior pet? In cats, professional opinions vary on this, but generally a cat becomes a "senior" somewhere between 7 and 11 years old. For dogs, the senior age depends on the dog's size; small dogs - around 11 years, medium dogs - 10 years, large dogs - 8

Hello Cortland & Bazetta! Today's years, giant dog breeds - 7 years old.

The solution - Consider adopting a senior pet and encourage others to do the same. Some senior pets may be in a position where they need to visit the vet more often or take medications, but others are in great health and lower maintenance than a new kitten or puppy! One of the best parts of adopting a senior pet is that they typically take lots of naps and have established personalities. This way, you know what you're getting as far as behavior and temperament when you meet them!

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



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
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
