# **Baby Animals in Spring**

animals! Here in Cortland, we have a lot of squirrels and rabbits, as well as deer. Sometimes, humans see a baby animal alone in the wild and think it is orphaned, but that is rarely the case. Wild animal mothers are devoted mothers, and they often leave their babies alone during the day to keep them safe, as babies get excited (and noisy) when they see their mothers. So, if you see a baby animal alone, be sure to call a local wildlife rehabilitator like Heather Merrit at (330)652-3381 or the Trumbull County Wildlife Officer, Marty Cisine, at (330)245-3037 for directions. It is illegal to keep a wild animal as a pet, and giving wild animal babies food or water could make them very sick or kill them.

Cortland's squirrel population is thriving! Squirrels are the first animals to have babies in the Spring, having

Spring is coming and it will bring their litter of 2-4 kits in February. Kits you can move it to safety, but if you do th it an abundance of adorable baby will be rocked in the treetops in their that, face it away from you and press dreys (big leaf clumps) until they are close to 3 months old. If a kit falls out of the tree, put it by the base of the tree and watch from afar, as its mother will

surely retrieve it if she's able. Wild rabbits will often make nests in yards, so it is important to check your yard before you mow it. Look for tufts of rabbit fur in tall grass. If you find a nest, you can mow around it by putting a basket over it or flags around it. Baby rabbits (kits) only need three weeks in a nest before they're able to go off on their own. If the nest is disturbed, rebuild it and put the bunnies back.

We have a Whitetail Deer Gang in town. Mother deer like to leave their fawns near people during the day to lessen predation. She will come to nurse several times per day. If you find a fawn in a dangerous situation, like in a road,

firmly between its shoulder blades before exiting quickly - this is the way moms tell fawns to stay put.

If you do get to see an adorable baby, please admire it from afar and call a specialist. Happy Spring!

#### From the Desk of the Superintendent

Many school-aged children have cell phones or other electronic devices that give them access to the online world including social media. These powerful communication tools offer benefits and problems associated with their use.

In February of this year, Fallon Research Group released findings from a national opinion poll regarding school bullying and online activities. This poll specifically looked at the intersection between bullying and the online environment.

The poll respondents fell into four categories: public school parents, no children in public schools, men, and women. According to the poll, in-person and online bullying were seen by public school parents to be equally prevalent. Those most concerned about bullying also believed that bullying was an issue in both in-person and online situations.

Within online environments, social media was seen as a major part of the bullying problem. Interestingly, social media companies were not considered best equipped to provide any solutions to the problem of online bullying.

Pollsters pointed out that in the responses many parents seemed to think the onus for social media bullying fell largely on their own shoulders and were most critical of their own shortcomings in this area. They seemed to recognize that they could be playing a larger role in helping to reduce or eliminate situations of online bullying-especially through their own efforts to carefully monitor their child's online activities.

Judge Marty Nosich, of the Trumbull County Eastern District Court in Brookfield, recently hosted seven Lakeview High School seniors for their job shadowing project. This is the second group of Lakeview students that Judge Nosich has hosted this school year. Judge Nosich has also hosted students from Maplewood, Joseph Badger, Howland and Windham school districts. This program allows the students to see court proceedings firsthand and not just on a movie or television show. There are several different professions within the court that the students were able to observe firsthand. Some examples include judges, attorneys, court clerks, bailiffs, prosecutors, public defenders and court reporters. Shadowing Judge Nosich gave them insight into court proceedings and what happens at court. Observing attorneys allowed the students to see how they advocate for their clients and present their cases. Court clerks handle administrative tasks and record keeping, while bailiffs maintain order in the courtroom. Court reporters create official transcripts of the proceedings. Shadowing all of these roles provides for a unique experience

and perspective on the inner workings of the court system.

The students spent their day observing traffic and criminal proceedings, and hearing directly from court employees, attorneys, and the judge about their specific education and work backgrounds. At the end of the day the students were provided lunch and Judge Nosich answered additional questions.

Judge Nosich said, "I want to thank Principal Herrholtz and the Lakeview schools. Lakeview was the first high school that we hosted and we have since expanded and hosted students from two counties and five high schools. I look forward to working with Principal Herrholtz and Lakeview in the future to continue offering these opportunities to the students."

Principal Herrholtz stated that "the students enjoyed their learning opportunities, and now have a better understanding of the court system. I want to thank Judge Nosich and all the court staff for their kindness, generosity, and the learning experiences they are providing to our students."







#### Pawsitivity - Foster Fail

When I started fostering kittens a few years ago, I had no idea how difficult it would be. Who wouldn't want more tiny, fluffy kittens in their life? Plus - you give them back! No long-term responsibility, because the understanding is that when you take on a foster animal, they will eventually go back to the shelter and be adopted, or the foster-based organization you're working with will find them a permanent home.

I really didn't know what I was getting into. All I knew was that I needed a spare room (to keep foster(s) separate from other animals in the home) and time to spend caring for and socializing them. Well I had a spare room and plenty of time (the best part of working from home) so I thought Sign me up!

The first litter I fostered were 3 tiny, 6-week old kittens. Cute as could be. They had already been weaned (kittens start to wean at 5 to 6 weeks old) and were very social. Although they were all the same age, one of the kittens, a fluffy gray male, was smaller than the other two. I was told to keep an eye on him and make sure he was eating. We named the kittens after varieties of peppers. The larger gray male kitten was "Serrano," the calico female was "Cayenne," and we named the tiny male "Ghost."

We planned to have the kittens for 2 weeks, until they'd reach 8 weeks

I would hold each one to pet and cuddle, then showed them how to play with kitty toys - all important aspects of socializing them to humans.

After 2 weeks, it was time to have the kittens weighed at the shelter. They had to be at least 2 pounds to return. Serrano and Cayenne were both over two pounds, and I cried while saying goodbye. Little Ghost was half a pound away, so we brought him back home for another few weeks.

We fell in love and couldn't bear to part with him. So we "foster failed," meaning we put an adoption application in on him and he's been a permanent part of our family ever since.

Britt believes Cortland has much to be desired. With our small-town feel,






