Dedication of America's Tallest Freestanding Marble Sculpture

On August 17, the tallest freestanding marble sculpture in America and the world's largest marble sculpture to be robotically carved was dedicated and unveiled in Cortland. Created and commissioned by Dr. Farid Naffah, MD, the sculpture, known as Lady Kindness, took more than six years to complete from conception to installation. The historic dedication took place at the "Evening Under the Stars" annual fundraiser event at the Cadobaz Estate in Bazetta. The evening included a proclamation from the Ohio Attorney General, as well as a 50-piece orchestra, with a classical pianist, a dedicated art exhibit hosted by Natasha Turovsky and fine dining.

The creation of Lady Kindness blends classical techniques with state-of-the-art methods. Naffah

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worked with local and international artisans to bring his vision to life. Through meticulous feedback, a life-sized clay model was created in Ohio. 3D scans of this model were then taken by an Italian company that sourced 200 tons of Carrara marble before digitally carving the 29.3-foot sculpture in Italy. After clearing customs in New York, Lady Kindness was shipped to Ohio where she was installed at the Cadobaz Estate.

This one-of-a-kind work is a testament to the enduring nature and boundless power of kindness. "I conceived and designed Lady Kindness during a time of strife and division in our country and

Blessed Statue Visits Ohio Living Lake Vista


The National Pilgrim Virgin Statue of Our Lady of Fatima was recently on display at Ohio Living Lake Vista, as part of its tour across Northeast Ohio. Known as the "Weeping Madonna," the blessed statue has traveled to dioceses across the United States, under the sponsorship of the World Apostolate of Fatima, USA, Our Lady's Blue Army. More than 200 people joined for the Ohio Living Lake Vista tour stop.


Designed in 1947 by the Michelangelo of Portugal, José Thedim,

the National Pilgrim Virgin Statue of Our Lady of Fatima was hand-carved by Thedim's son and given to the U.S. after being blessed by Pope St. Paul VI in 1967. On July 16, 1972, photos that depicted the statue weeping were widely circulated, resulting in its association as the "Weeping Madonna." "This is the first time the statue has visited the area 38 years," said Katie Moran, a Niles, Ohio resident with family ties to Ohio Living Lake Vista. "My mother was part of facilitating the

last tour, and I was excited to follow in her footsteps. People come to the statue with all kinds of needs - physical, emotional, and beyond, and they leave with graces and blessings. I was particularly glad we could visit four senior living communities, including Ohio Living Lake Vista, to spread our message of hope and peace."

the world," said Naffah. "She offers a rose, a symbol of love, to all, especially the neglected, the abandoned, and the forgotten. Lady Kindness is the most important art project of my life to date. Her figure represents the culmination of my life's work to embody kindness, a lesson introduced to me by my grandmother and then instilled in me by my mother."

Born in Beirut, Lebanon, Naffah moved to New York City to pursue his education. He graduated from Columbia University and earned his M.D. from the Albert Einstein College of Medicine. He completed a threeyear residency in Internal Medicine at the Mayo Clinic, followed by a threeyear fellowship in gastroenterology at the Johns Hopkins Hospital, during which he also earned a Master's Degree in Computer Science from the Johns Hopkins School of Engineering. EPA Requires You To Identify Your Water Lines

The EPA is requiring all Public Water Systems to identify all service lines by October 2024. That includes the water line that is coming into your home or business (between the meter and the wall) and the water lines throughout your home or business. These are sometimes the same and sometimes different. The City of Cortland is asking for your help in identifying these lines, it takes less than 1 minute. Our web site, cityofcortland.org has pictures explaining how to identify your lines.

We are providing three different ways of reporting this information back to us. The form included in your water/ sewer bill that you can fill out by hand and return to us by mail (by itself or with your water bill), drop box at city hall or hand deliver to city hall. Water Department, 400 N. High St., Cortland, OH 44410

OR go online and complete the form from a cell phone, tablet or computer. Visit our web site at cityofcortland.org, scroll down to the News Flash and click on "Identify water lines". That will take you to a link to complete the form. The information will be sent directly to us. OR scan the QR code below and complete the form from a cell phone or tablet. The information will be sent directly to us.

If you are not comfortable identifying this information for us, we would be more than happy to help. Just call 330-637-3011 and Christine will make an appointment to have someone from the service department stop out and identify your lines for you. THIS IS MANDATORY. If we do not receive information back from you and because this is required by the EPA, lack of information submitted to us could result in a possible shutoff of your water. We greatly appreciate your help with this requirement.

How To Identify Water Lines. First, find a strong magnet. If the magnet sticks to the pipe, then you have a galvanized (steel) line. If it does not stick, then move on to the scratch test.

Second, take a coin and scratch the pipe. What do you see? If it's a shiny copper color, then you have a copper line. If it's a shiny silver color, then you have a lead line. If there is no shine and the line is black, white, red or blue, you have a plastic line.

Sci-Fi & Fantasy Museum **Coming To Warren**

A science fiction and fantasy museum is moving forward in Warren. A year ago, the idea for the museum began when Warren native John Zabrucky donated hundreds of props he created through his company, Hollywood prop house Modern Props, to the Trumbull County Historical Society. Among the over 200 movies and tv shows Zabrucky designed for are icon sci-fi classics Blade Runner, Ghostbusters, Men in Black, and most of the Star Trek series.

Now, a year after accepting Zabrucky's collection, the museum has a name: Museum of Science Fiction & Fantasy Arts. "Our goal is to create a nationally significant museum that looks at the art of worldbuilding, the science behind science fiction and the rise of science fiction & fantasy in mainstream culture," says TCHS Executive Director Meghan Reed.

TCHS Director of Operations & Outreach, Ryan MacLennan, has also been a part of the steering committee since the beginning. "It seemed like the best name for a museum that could sustain itself long term, that could be a national draw," MacLennan said. "Other names that were suggested seemed a little bit more kitsch, a little bit more localized, and we want to make this a museum that is sustainable long term and impacts our community."

In addition to selecting a name, the museum's steering committee has engaged Hickok Cole, an architecture firm based in Washington D.C., to lead the design process after purchasing a building at 410 Main Ave as the museum's home. Hickok Cole's resume includes The International Spy Museum, National Geographic Pavilion and the headquarters of National Public Radio.

"Hickok Cole has just done such impressive work. They've obviously worked with museum collections and museum buildings. They have a full team of people who are very capable and competent doing this work. They speak the language, so to speak. For all of our committee members, it was a unanimous decision that they were the ones to lead this project forward," said Reed.





Labor Day is listed as the unofficial end of summer and I thought summer just started. The first day of fall is on Sept. 22, according to the Farmers Almanac. Labor Day is on Monday, Sept. 2. My calendar says hunting season starts at the end of September. It reminds me of the cartoon where a man asked a lady what comes after summer and she answered hunting season.

Labor Day became a national holiday in 1894 under then-President Grover Cleveland. The holiday was slated to be observed on the first Monday in September annually, according to the U.S. Department of Labor. Labor Day's history dates back to the labor movement of the 19th century, where labor activists pushed for the holiday to recognize that it was workers who were behind America's prosperity, according to the federal department.

The first recorded Labor Day celebration took place in 1882 in New York. In the late 1800s, many worked 12hour days for a basic living, and children worked in mills, factories, and mines, earning far less than adults, according



to the History Channel. During this time, labor unions increased their efforts to call for better working conditions, hours, and pay. It used to be wearing white after Labor Day was taboo contrary. This rule can be traced back to the late 19th century and the old money elite trying to "elevate themselves above" the newly wealthy. Another possibility behind this rule is that people swapped their light summer clothes for darker tones and thicker fabrics due to the changing seasons, USA TODAY reported. I am hoping we can still wear white after labor day here in Ohio because that would mean the weather will stay warm, however, I have learned after living here almost three years one has no idea what to wear, given the fact the weather here is unpredictable.

1 Corinthians 15:58 says, "Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters, stand firm. Let nothing move you. 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City Of Cortland Curbside **Brush Pickup Policy**

The City of Cortland Service street.

Department will conduct branch and limb pick up service along city streets starting in April and continuing through October. Pick-up for the entire city is the week of the 4th Monday of each month. There will be one pick-up per month per household. The service day may vary during the collection week due to weather and workload. As noted below, branches should be placed at the curb no later than the Sunday prior to collection week to ensure removal. **One** pass will be made on each street.

RULES AND REGULATIONS • Branches and limbs need to be placed at the curb no later than the Sunday before the scheduled collection week.

picked up (trimmed/pruned and rootfree) Branches and limbs must be no

longer than 6' in length and can be up to 4" in diameter.

The city will pick up a single brush pile no larger than 6' x 8' per household. Do not combine piles with your

No firewood, large logs or complete trees will be picked up.

Ohio Driver's Licenses And Ids Can Now Be Added To Apple Wallet

Ohio announced today that Ohioans can now add their Ohio-issued driver's license or state identification card to Apple Wallet for use in person at select businesses, in select apps, and at Transportation Security Administration (TSA) security checkpoints, including at John Glenn Columbus International Airport and the Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport.

Ohio also launched a free age verification app for businesses, enabling them to securely and privately accept customers' mobile driver's licenses and ID cards in person using an iPhone.

"Ohio has always been a leader in innovation, and now we are the fifth state in the country that gives residents the option to securely add their driver's license to Apple Wallet," said Governor DeWine. "This is another example of how Ohio is using technology to better serve its customers and residents."

InnovateOhio aims to make Ohio the most innovative, entrepreneurial state in the Midwest while enhancing convenience for residents through technology. Adding your Ohio driver's license or ID to Apple Wallet is the latest example of modernizing the

BMV and simplifying processes for Ohioans. They have also launched an app for businesses to read Ohio Mobile IDs, enabling them to utilize this new service.

InnovateOhio and the Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) collaborated with Apple to give Ohioans the option to add their mobile driver's licenses and identification cards to Apple Wallet, which provides a secure and private way for residents to add and present their IDs on iPhone and Apple Watch.

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You Can Fund Your Children's **College Education** And Retirement Simultaneously - Here's How

Discuss what your contribution will look like at their preferred colleges. For example, if you agree to pay a set amount, perhaps this money will fully cover community college or a substantial amount at a state school, but it may leave a larger portion of the bill outstanding at a private college. Breaking down the costs for your child can help them make an informed decision about how much student debt (or scholarships, grants, etc.) are needed to cover the bill.

No matter your financial situation, know that it is possible to make meaningful progress toward both goals, particularly if you are intentional about how to allocate your savings. Consult a financial advisor and tax professional if you want help setting specific savings goals and understanding the various investing options available to you.

Upcoming Changes To Medicare Prescription Drug Coverage

Original Medicare Insurance has two parts: Part A Hospital Insurance and Part B Medical Insurance. Part D, Prescription Drug coverage is not included with these as part of Original Medicare, but you can get coverage from independent insurance companies through either a stand-alone Medicare Prescription Drug Plan (PDP) or through a Medicare Advantage Plan that includes prescription coverage. To join a Medicare Prescription plan, you must be entitled to Medicare Part A or enrolled in Part B and live in the service area of the plan you want to join.

Several changes are coming in 2025 to the basic plan formats as part of the Inflation Reduction Act that was passed in 2022. Currently there are four phases to Part D coverage costs: deductible, initial coverage, coverage gap and catastrophic coverage. Next year the coverage gap, also referred to as the donut hole will be eliminated.

For 2024 the annual deductible could have been between \$0-\$545 in 2025 insurance companies can set their deductible between \$0-\$590. This is the phase where the individual pays 100% of the costs of the prescriptions until the deductible is met. After the deductible is met, the initial phase is where you pay a set copay amount or coinsurance percentage depending on the drug tier, and the plan pays the remainder of the costs.

In 2024 you remained in the initial coverage phase until the total drug costs reached \$5,030 at which time you would enter the Coverage Gap (donut hole). It is important to remember this amount is based on the actual retail cost of the drug not the amount you pay to the pharmacy as a copay. For 2024, during the donut hole or coverage gap phase individuals are responsible to pay 25% of the actual retail cost of the prescription until your true out-of-pocket costs reach \$8,000. At that point you would enter catastrophic coverage and pay \$0 through the end of the year.

details of this program are still being worked out, but it will be an optional program where those with high costing medications can choose to participate in a program through their insurance company where payments are divided by the remaining months of the year and made to an account that is then used to pay for the prescriptions similar to a budget plan for utilities.

One exception to this format will continue to be insulin medications. There are insulin savings programs that limit the cost of insulin to \$35 per month without regard to the different Part D phases. Each plan can decide if they will participate in the program and which specific insulins they will include for this price.

If you cannot afford your medications, there are different options that may be available to help with these costs depending on your specific situation. You may qualify for "Extra Help" through Medicare if you meet certain income limits or receive both Medicare and Medicaid. Many manufacturers offer assistance programs to help offset costs. Information for these can be obtained from your insurance agent, Medicare. gov and oftentimes your physician's office. If you are a veteran, it might be helpful to check and see if you can receive prescriptions through the VA.

Specific plan information will not be available until October 1st and now it is unclear how these changes may affect individual plans. Your current plan is required to send you an "Annual Notice of Change" to inform you of any changes to your plan including costs or coverage changes. These notices are typically mailed in late September. Each year during the Medicare Annual Enrollment Period which runs October 15th through December 7th you can change your Medicare Advantage Prescription Drug plan or stand-alone Prescription Drug plan for the next year. Coming in 2025 the initial phase With all the changes to prescription threshold will be lowered to \$2,000 coverage costs it will be especially important to review your options for 2025. Check for Legitimacy. Unfortunately, scams are common in the world of charitable giving, so it's important to make sure the charity is legitimate. Verify that the charity is registered with the IRS as a 501(c)(3) organization-this also means your donation will be taxdeductible. Most reputable charities will provide their EIN (Employer Identification Number), which you can use to look them up on the IRS website.

Trust Your Instincts. Finally, trust your gut. If something feels off about a charity-whether it's a lack of information, what people are saying about the organization, or anything else-don't hesitate to give to another organization. There are plenty of worthy causes out there that will appreciate your support.

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


Wearing your backpack the proper way

The election season is upon us and soon we will be overwhelmed with political signs. However there are rules that we all need to follow. Cortland and Bazetta, as do all neighboring governmental entities, have similar but different rules.

Bazetta Township: According to Pete Pizzulo, Township Zoning Inspector, the content of the signs is a matter of free speech. The only restrictions on them are if you block a right of way or if you are obstructing the view of traffic or traffic signs etc. For more information you can email him at ppizzulo@bazettatwp.org. The office phone is(330) 637-8816. The Zoning Inspector's office hours are Tuesdays from 6:00 pm – 9:00 pm.

Cortland City rules regarding political signs: With the General Election set for November 5, it is a great opportunity to review the city's rules governing Political Signs, which can be found on the city's website at https:// codelibrary.amlegal.com/codes/ cortland/latest/cortland_oh/0-0-0-21489.

Two regulations that have the highest rates of noncompliance. The

first rule states that political signs are "permitted only during the period beginning forty-five (45) days prior to the election for which the sign is intended." With the general election on November 5 this year, signs cannot be put up earlier than September 21.

The second regulation that faces noncompliance is that "all political signs shall be set back at least 10' from the edge of the pavement of the street." Other regulations for political signs include:

• Signs shall be removed not later than seven (7) days after said election day (November 12 this year.)

• No political sign shall be placed on any utility pole or tree in the public right-of-way.

• No such sign shall be located in a manner as to obstruct egress or ingress to adjacent property, pedestrian traffic on the public way, or as to obstruct the vision of drivers at an intersection.


Should any political signs violate these regulations, they will be removed and you may retrieve them at City Hall, 400 N. High St near the north door or near the shed. Signs will be held for two (2) weeks and then they will be disposed of.


