like 2020. The difference is that 1920 was to vote. Saudi Arabian women were made a giant leap forward for women. The 19th Amendment granting women suffrage into law. Before that, some states had passed women's suffrage, but this was for the entire country. My grandmother was 25 years old and had married a World War I veteran just a few months before the amendment. She voted in every election until she passed away in 1972.

The suffrage for women movement had been ongoing in the United States since 1848, but it was an issue in Europe and Australia also. Australia enabled women to vote in 1902, while Finland was the first country in Europe to implement the right to vote and run for office in 1906. Other European countries followed the suffrage movement during the 20th century with the Swiss canton of Appenzell Innerhoden being the last

The year 1920 was a leap year, just one in 1986 to grant women the right 2015 - in municipal elections.

Suffrage for women, of course, was just the beginning of positive changes for women in the United States, but it was probably the most important. Women had always been partners, but not always treated as equals. It is no surprise that their importance in settling our country was first formally recognized by law in the western movement. Wyoming was the first to grant women suffrage in 1869. All through the west women worked next to their husbands in the fields, fed and clothed the family, all while taking care of children and the home. Recognizing their part in settling our country was the first step toward equality.

and Political Science (1984) and a law degree (2013) from the University of Akron Law School.

When Deidre and her husband Don decided to move to Cortland in 1992, they were mainly interested in the schools for their children. They had married shortly after Deidre's 1984 graduation from Miami University of Ohio and soon had a young girl and boy. "Although I was raised in Warren and graduated from Warren G. Harding high school in 1980, both my grandmother and great grandmother were married into the Biggin family of Cortland. It was family and the school system that brought us to Cortland," she said. She said that their children were enrolled in Lakeview. All three children, Katie, David and Hannah (born a few years later in Cortland) are Lakeview graduates. The girls are married and the Petroskys have one granddaughter.

Although Deidre and Donspent their first few years in Cortland establishing Don's construction business, Deidre's interest in the city's administration led to an invitation to fill an opening in City Council in 1998. While serving on council, she decided to attend law

school. "I wasn't interested in becoming a lawyer, but I was interested in law and being a public servant." During that time, she was re-elected for each term on council until her election as mayor, with her term beginning in January 2020. She is the third woman mayor in Cortland's history. The first was Sandra Roscoe (1988 - 1992). The second was Melissa Long (2000-2003).

As the mayor, Deidre's goal is to work and create a new Comprehensive & Strategic Plan for the city. "The most recent one was written in the 1990s. Reviewing goals and objectives is important," she said, for the city to move forward. "But even more important are that applications for grants need to be made. It is imperative that land use be discussed and decided upon. To do this," she said, "the city will conduct two public meetings." Residents will be notified when meeting dates are planned.

The new mayor appreciates the work that has been done in this new century by former mayors Curt Moll and Iim Woofter and is enthusiastic about being part of bringing the Cortland Vision into even clearer focus. Please watch for notices for the public meetings



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Help for kids who stutter is as close as your library

Kids who stutter have a lot to say, and friends can show them how in "Stuttering: For Kids By Kids," a DVD in English and Spanish starring kids who stutter, available at most public libraries or through interlibrary loan.

Many children who stutter have never met others who struggle with the same disability. In this DVD from the Stuttering Foundation, they meet kids who recount how they handle challenges such as teasing, speaking out in class, and teaching others about stuttering.

Swish, a lively and engaging animated basketball character designed by students at Purdue University, narrates the DVD. The children, who range in age from first-graders to high school students, offer frank and sometimes differing views of stuttering.

For example, Matthew, age 10, says about his speech difficulties, "It's no big deal;" but Kate, age 9, worries about talking, what is going to happen next and whether or not she'll stutter. Arianne, age 14, says, "The hardest part about stuttering is to get through it and to stay in there when you're stuck." Umang, age 12, agrees, "Sometimes it

gets kind of annoying when you want to say something and you can't. I also get worried what other people might think if I do stutter and wonder if I'll be able to get out of my blocks and things."

'All those interested in helping kids learn more about stuttering will want to see this tape," said speech-language pathologist Bill Murphy of Purdue University. "The children featured are a perfect example of how to openly and honestly handle stuttering." "This is an important tool for families and teachers of kids who stutter," added Jane Fraser, president of the nonprofit Stuttering Foundation.

Other professionals and specialists in stuttering in this production include Kristin Chmela of Northwestern University, Joe Donaher of Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, Lisa Scott of Florida State University, and Lee Caggiano of Friends.

The

72-year-old nonprofit Foundation has provided free materials to public libraries nationwide. A library that will shelve them can download a request form at www.stutteringhelp. org/libraries-information.



occurred during the War of 1812 when only about a dozen families were settled around the High Street and Walnut Run areas. The men had been called to active duty to fight in the war. It was harvesting time for the oat crop. As the days dragged on, the crop was in danger of spoiling. The women gathered, placed their little children in the care of the older children under the shade of tree, and harvested the crop. When the men returned home, the crop was neatly tied and piled and safe.

There are many more stories of the contributions of women in our local history. Much of the work was unpaid. I remember that funds for the carpeting in the Cortland Christian Church were raised by a few women who collected pennies for years. Women organized dinners, craft shows and programs. They volunteered at Vacation Bible Schools. What would we have done without the dozens of lunches, cookies and church suppers that women organized?

Women showed their strength in keeping the economy running during the World Wars. They showed ability, grit and determination as they did the heavy work in factories for the war effort. The program honoring the "Rosie Riveters" of WWII at the 2019 Veterans Day program at Kent State Trumbull was an eye-opener to many of us babyboomers born after the war. It was a fantastic program.

During the 1970s and 1980s women started the town's Specialty Shops to bring more business to Cortland. Carol Caronite opened the very first shop, "Grandma's House" in the big yellow house on Mecca Street, now a reflexology doctor's office. "After that several more women opened shops around town," she said. Bus tours visited the town to tour our craft, quilt, needlework and antique shops. The Opera House was a favorite stop for the tours where Dorothy Klein, Mary Case and Ann Hoover related the history of the town in an entertaining way.

Today 56 percent of the businesses in Cortland are owned by women. Be sure to read Thom Foley's "Women in Business" article. We've come a long way!



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IRS launches Identity Theft Central

Focuses on needs of taxpayers, tax professionals and businesses

The Internal Revenue Service has launched Identity Theft Central, designed to improve online access to information on identity theft and data security protection for taxpayers, tax professionals and businesses.

Located on IRS.gov, Identity Theft Central is available 24/7 at irs.gov/ identitytheft. It is a resource on how to report identity theft, how taxpayers can protect themselves against phishing, online scams and more.

Improving awareness and outreach are hallmarks of initiatives to combat identity theft coordinated by the IRS, state tax agencies and the nation's tax industry, all working in partnership under the Security Summit banner.

Since 2015, the Security Summit partners have made substantial progress in the fight against tax-related identity theft. But thieves are still constantly looking for ways to steal the identities of individuals, tax professionals and businesses in order to file fraudulent tax returns for refunds.

The partnership has taken a number of steps to help educate and improve protections for taxpayers, tax professionals and businesses. As part of this effort, the IRS has redesigned the information into a new, streamlined page – Identity Theft Central – to help people get information they need on ID theft, scams and schemes.

From this special page, people can get specific information including:

- The Internal Revenue Service Taxpayer Guide to Identity Theft, has launched Identity Theft Central, designed to improve online access to becomes a victim of identity theft
 - Identity Theft Information for Tax Professionals, including knowing responsibilities under the law
 - Identity Theft Information for Businesses, including how to recognize the signs of identity theft

The page also features videos on key topics that can be used by taxpayers or partner groups. The new page includes a video message from IRS Commissioner Chuck Rettig, warning signs for phishing email scams – a common tactic used for identity theft – and steps for people to protect their computer and phone.

Tax professionals and others may want to bookmark Identity Theft Central and check their specific guidance periodically for updates.

This is part of an ongoing effort by the IRS to share identity theft-related information with the public. The IRS continues to look for ways to raise awareness and improve education and products related to identity theft for taxpayers and the tax professional community.

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
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Tomething to Think About By Rev. Donald P. Barnes, Chaplain

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
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'Noticed'

modern society, yet they have always played important parts throughout all of history. Unfortunately, some of these roles go unnoticed in part out of ignorance of knowing history, but also in part to push certain agendas in our society for better or for worse. 




