## Ford Fund distributes over 1 million face masks to communities across Ohio

Mark Thomas Ford and other Ohio Ford Dealers helped distribute over a million face masks in neighborhoods and suburbs across Ohio on Tuesday, March 9. Residents were invited to stop by any distribution site to pick up 20 disposable face masks while supplies lasted. The Mask Donation Day is part of Ford's #FinishStrong initiative - a public call to action encouraging Americans to pull together, protect each other and help save lives in the months ahead until COVID-19 vaccines become more widely available.

The event took place at nearly 100 Ohio Ford dealerships.

Ford has been a leader in COVID-19 mitigation efforts since April 2020 and one of the first manufacturers to pivot toward making personal protective equipment (PPE). 

# **Tobacco cessation help for veterans**By Teresa Merrick, R.N., PHN - Trumbull County Combined Health District

The public view of smoking has changed in the last decade, but veterans are still at risk of developing an addiction to nicotine, according to recoveryfirst.org.

Statistics showed that reasons veterans smoked were due to stress (47.7%), boredom (25.1%) and nicotine addiction (22.7%). "Younger veterans of the Iraq and Afghanistan conflicts did not seem to be at a higher or lower risk for dependence compared to veterans of other combat scenarios, including Vietnam." Over one third of service

members start using tobacco after they enter military service.

Post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) increases chances the veteran will use nicotine products to help them reduce stress. Stressors on our military, post deployment, also include no health insurance (1%), living in poverty (7%) and less than a high school diploma (9%), for just a few examples. Male veterans smoked 12.6 times every day and female veterans smoked 10.3 times every day on average.

# ON COURSE Navigating your Insurance Needs

# What are the different parts of Medicare insurance?

Medicare is health insurance for people 65 and older, along with those that have been receiving Social Security or Railroad Disability for 24 months and those with End-Stage Renal Disease. There are different parts to Medicare insurance that cover specific services.

Medicare Part A covers inpatient services such as hospitalization, skilled nursing facilities, hospice, and some home health care. For most people, Part A has no cost if you or your spouse worked and paid into Medicare for enough time. You can pick up Part A at age 65 even if you are still working and covered under employer insurance. If you do not qualify for premium free Part A, you can buy the coverage for a monthly premium as long as you also choose to enroll in Part B and pay that premium.

Medicare Part B is medical insurance that covers most outpatient services such as doctors' services, tests, lab services, preventative services, ambulance services, and medical supplies. In specific circumstances Part B will also cover some prescription drugs including injections and infusions that you cannot administer to yourself and are received under the supervision of a doctor or other trained personnel. Part B of Medicare insurance has a monthly premium based on income. Most people will pay \$148.50 per month this year however, those with low income and limited resources may qualify for reduced premiums and those with a higher household income may pay an extra charge.

Medicare Part D is prescription drug coverage including many shots and vaccines. Part D is not included with the standard Parts A&B and requires a separate Prescription Drug Plan or policy. You are not required to pick up separate drug coverage, however if you do not have coverage within 63 days of starting Medicare or losing credible

employer coverage, there will be a penalty imposed on the premium when you do apply for coverage. Once again, there are programs to help people with the costs of Part D premiums and the cost of medications if you qualify.

While Medicare Insurance covers many things there are co-pays and costs that the individual is responsible for when seeking care. These costs can add up quickly, therefore most people will pick up either Medicare Supplement Insurance or a Medicare Advantage Plan (Part C) to fill in the gaps. Part C of Medicare is also referred to as a Medicare Advantage Plan. These plans include Parts A, B and D of Medicare and they also have extra benefits including vision, dental, hearing, and other services depending on the plan that is chosen. Typically Advantage plan premiums are low or no cost but have copays for services. Medicare Supplement Insurance plans work as a secondary insurance to original Medicare Insurance and help to cover the costs that Medicare does not. Medicare Advantage plans include prescription coverage, Supplement plans do not. Therefore, a separate plan needs to be purchased.

There are several different choices when applying for Medicare and choosing the option that works best for your specific situation. It can be very confusing and overwhelming. Most local agents available to explain your options and help you navigate through the process of setting up your insurance at no charge. When you choose a local agent over the agent you may call on the "800" number, they are also available to help after you have received coverage and answers any questions you may have.



Trained counselors staff the call line and counseling is offered in English and Spanish. You will work with a counselor to create a personal plan that works for you. All calls are confidential and not entered in your VA electronic medical record.

The Ohio Tobacco Quit Line is confidential and free of charge. Call 1-800-784-8669 (1-800-QUIT NOW) or www.smokefree.gov. Available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and languages such as Spanish, Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese, French and TTY are available. Eligible recipients may receive up to eight weeks of their choice of nicotine patches, gum or lozenges sent directly to their home.

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



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# What to know as you consider travel plans today

For so many people who love to travel, it's been a tough 12 months since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. While vaccines give us hope that the crisis will ease, traveling today still requires careful planning.

COVID-19 is a factor in booking flights and making other travel arrangements. Here are some important considerations.

#### Check requirements to travel destinations

Currently, a number of countries and even selected states within the U.S. require that you can prove a negative COVID-19 test in the past 72 hours in order to enter. Importantly for those planning travel overseas, you will be required to get a COVID-19 test coming from most countries in order to return home.

To this point, being vaccinated generally does not alter the requirement to be tested first. If you've contracted COVID-19 within three months of your trip and are no longer symptomatic, you may not be required to get a test to re-enter the U.S. You'll want to take the time to explore all of the rules for your intended destination.

#### Take note of airline cancellation policies

The current environment increases the chance that you will have to alter your plans at the last minute or sooner. Many airlines today offer greater flexibility to deal with cancellations and changes than was the case prior to COVID-19. Be sure to check with your carrier to understand their rules. While you may not be able to collect a refund, many airlines will allow cancellations and apply the cost you paid toward re-booking a different flight at another time or offer a voucher for future travel. As you make plans, consider your ability or willingness to fly again on the same airline in the future in order to take advantage of this flexibility.

#### Reservations for accommodations

Major hotel chains and even some services that allow you to reserve private rooms or properties may be more lenient these days when it comes to potential refunds. Again, it's important to check the terms of your reservation before you lock it in to know whether you face any costs if you are forced to cancel or cut your trip short.

#### **Travel Insurance**

Given the added flexibility to rebook flights and cancel hotel reservations, that aspect of travel insurance may be less important today than was the case prior to COVID-19. Yet some form of travel insurance may make sense, and medical coverage can be particularly important for overseas travel. Be aware that typical trip insurance won't include coronavirus as a "covered reason" for cancellation. That may require a "cancel for any reason" policy. Be sure to understand the terms of the policy before you go.

#### Staying stateside

Given the complications associated with airline and overseas travel, you might prefer car travel in the coming months. It can help limit your contact with larger groups of people and most large chain hotels put an emphasis on providing a safe environment. If you plan to vacation in the U.S. and have flexibility with time, going over-theroad may prove to be a simpler option.



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# Warren Library to temporarily close until March 27

The Warren Library, 444 Mahoning Ave. NW, will be closed to the public through March 27, 2021 while some sections of the library are rearranged in preparation for the upcoming expansion project.

The Children's Department book shelves, tables, computers, and desks; the adult public computers; and fiction and nonfiction book shelves will all be moved or shifted so that they may still be accessed while a one-story addition is built onto the south side of the library. Warren-Trumbull County Public Library (W-TCPL) locations in Brookfield, Cortland, Howland, Liberty and Lordstown will remain open usual hours during the Warren Library shutdown.

No Warren Library materials will be due during the closure. Customers may still return items to the book/ media drops located on the outside of the building or to any W-TCPL location.

Materials that were placed on hold through the library's online catalog may be picked up in the Warren Library lobby between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

most weekdays during the closure. Customers will be notified if they have items available for pickup.

Construction is expected to begin this spring for the project to increase the Warren Library's size by about 25 percent. W-TCPL Director Jim Wilkins said the majority of the library's new space will be utilized for the Children's Department and the Teen Area to expand for enhanced programming and resources.

Sections of the current Warren Library building will also be renovated to better support the library's increasing technology needs and the need for more flexible spaces and meeting rooms. The library will increase its number of meeting spaces from two to 11, with various size rooms to accommodate from 2 to 120 people.

The entire project is expected to take 18 to 24 months to complete.

# New Library Pickup Lockers offer nocontact, 24/7 pickup of reserved materials

The Warren-Trumbull County Public Library's Cortland and Liberty locations are debuting a new 24/7 automated pickup service.

Outdoor Pickup Lockers have been installed at the Cortland Library, 578 Lakeview Drive, and the Liberty Library, 415 Churchill-Hubbard Road. Located outside each library, the lockers are available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Customers who are unable to get to the library during business hours can now choose to have their reserved materials placed in the Pickup Lockers for self-service after-hours pickup. The automated lockers can also be utilized by customers desiring a contactless library experience.

When customers place a request for an item through the library's online catalog, they will be prompted to select their pickup location. Customers who wish to use the Pickup Lockers should choose either the Cortland Pickup Locker or the Liberty Pickup Locker as their preferred location when requesting materials.

When the items are available, staff will check the items out to the customer,

place them in one of the locker bays, and notify the customer that their items are ready for pickup.


To open their locker, the customer will simply hold their library card's barcode under the scanner on the locker or enter the last four digits of the card number. The correct assigned locker door will open, and the checked-out materials can be easily removed.

Customers will have 72 hours to pick up items in the lockers before items are checked back in and returned to the shelves. Customers bringing back library materials should utilize the outdoor book and media returns and not put returns in the Pickup Lockers.

The lockers were purchased with funds received from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund: Public Library Assistance Program administered through the state of Ohio.

Both locker banks offer 20 bays each. The lockers were purchased from LEID Products and were made in the USA with weather-resistant 16-gauge galvanized steel.

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
