# 4th Annual Citywide Garage Sale

Annual Garage Sale is scheduled for June 9-11. Registration includes garage sale permit, address on our sale list, advertisement in Tribune and on our com/groups/44410garagesale There interactive map. If you live in Cortland you are required to have a permit.

To streamline the process we have arranged to get the permits from the city. They will be emailed to you if you register online and mailed to you if you register by mail. Any locations outside of the City of Cortland MUST get your own permit, if required. However, we are asking for \$5 to cover the advertising and to be listed on our map and list.

There are three options for when you can have your sale:

- 2 Days, June 9, 10 Fri-Sat, \$10.00
- 3 days, June 9, 10, 11, Fri-Sat-Sun, \$12.50
- 3 days, June 8, 9, 10 Thurs Fri Sat, \$12.50

The City Ordinance prohibits more than 3 days per sale.

Registration will begin May 1 and end May 31. There are three ways to register:

- On Facebook go to Facebook. will be a digital link to register and pay.
- You can mail the following information to PO BOX 424 Cortland, OH 44410. Name, email address, phone, address of sale, dates of your sale. Include a check made out to Jodi Clark for the proper amount and a selfaddressed stamped envelope. Your permit will be mailed back to you.







Research has shown that incentives, such as diapers, are a unique and positive motivator to aid in behavior change. We know that encouraging pregnant women to quit smoking is vital to ensuring the best birth outcomes. Pregnant women who smoke have an extra motivation to guit - the health of their unborn child. Smoking during pregnancy can lead to low birthweights in infants and premature birth.

In the longer term, maternal smoking during pregnancy is associated with a range of poor outcomes in children including ADHD, and cognitive dysfunction. Children who grow up in smoke-free homes enjoy many health benefits, so it is equally important to remain quit. To date, over 18,000 women and their families across



the United States have benefited from this program.


# Class of 2023 Spotlight Bulldog



### **Pawsitivity Animal Transport**

the sunshine. This issue I'll be providing important and life-saving for thousands information about transport.

What is animal transport? It's exactly what it sounds like, transporting (via vehicle) an animal from one place to another. Organizations may move animals for a multitude of reasons.

If a humane team removes animals from an unsuitable environment (such as a hoarding situation), they sometimes seize animals you wouldn't typically find wandering around the living room! (Lions, tigers, and bears, oh my! Okay, not really bears, but you get the point.) Some of these more exotic animals may need to be transported to a zoo or sanctuary.

Adoptable pets may also be transported from an overpopulated pound or shelter to a shelter with more space. Or the animal may require specialized attention or care which they can only get at the new destination.

In some cases, adoptable pets that have not found homes after a long period at the shelter may need to be moved. Transporting them to a new geographic area where the demand for adoptable animals is higher, or even just getting "fresh eyes" on them in a new shelter, can help them find their "furever" home right away.

Hey there! Hope you're enjoying reason, animal transport is incredibly of animals each year. However, transport is also costly and often unrealistic for a pound/shelter to do on their own. Shelter resources such as funding and staff are often spread thin, so they may rely on volunteers to drive animals to or from their location.

If you're lucky enough to own a reliable vehicle, have some extra cash to spend on gas, and some time on your hands to do some driving, consider animal transport. Transport runs are typically broken up into "legs" (approximately an hour) so it can sometimes take 5 to 20 people to move an animal from one place to the next! These shorter sections of travel are much more manageable for animal transport volunteers.

There are some nuances regarding animal transport that are too extensive to include here. But if you reach out to your local shelter to see if they have a transport program and would like some assistance, they will be able to provide this information for you.





were His mother, His mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw His mother and the disciple He loved standing there, He said to His mother, "Woman, recognize their parents. They take them here is your son." Then He said to the disciple, "Here is your mother." And from that hour the disciple took her into his home" (John 19:25-27, HCSB). Jesus cared for His mother. to remember them if they have fallen asleep in the Lord, going on before you in faith, and cherish those memories of



# What You Should Know About the Debt Ceiling Debate

If you've been keeping up on news coming out of Washington, D.C., you know that Congress is once again grappling with a need to raise the federal government's debt ceiling limit. Legislation to that effect would provide the U.S. Treasury with authorization to issue new debt to help cover the costs of programs already approved by Congress. This is a typically routine action that avoids the U.S. defaulting on its loans. However, given the polarized political climate and hardened positions on both sides of the aisle, Congress so far has not negotiated an agreement to raise the debt ceiling by the summer deadline.

How could the issue play out and what are the possible ramifications for the financial markets?

### What's happening in Washington

The need for Congress to take action and increase the debt ceiling occurs periodically. This year, similar to prior instances, it has become a political matter with differing views on how to effectively solve the problem at hand. If the debt ceiling is not raised on a timely basis, the federal government could default on its debt. This is significant as investors look upon U.S. Treasury bonds as debt securities that are backed by "the full faith and credit of the United States." A default could tarnish that reputation, and potentially result in the government having to pay higher interest rates to attract bond investors.

At this point, the U.S. Treasury has reached its debt ceiling limit as previously authorized by Congress, and is undertaking "extraordinary measures" to avoid a debt default. Treasury officials indicate that these measures will likely be exhausted by June 2023. At that time, without

Congress acting to raise the debt ceiling, a U.S. government default becomes a real possibility.

#### Markets maintain a wary eye

What would a debt default mean? In a speech on Feb. 14, 2023, Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen stated that in the longer term, a default would mean "Future investments, including public investments, would become substantially more costly." If interest rates on government bonds were forced higher, the impact could be felt across the bond market, pushing interest rates on other types of debt higher.

More directly, according to Yellen, "the federal government would be unable to issue payments to millions of Americans, including our military families and seniors who rely on Social Security." Costlier borrowing could also reverberate to consumers as they obtain mortgages, car loans and other forms of debt.

Would this have a significant and extended negative effect on the economy? That's an open question, but minimally we should expect that the longer the debate lingers and the closer the deadline draws near without resolution, we may face increased market volatility While you don't want to overhaul your long-term financial plan based on speculation over how it will play out you may want to consult with your advisor about how to address potential, near-term ramifications that could be reflected in more volatile markets.

# City Of Cortland Curbside Brush Pickup Policy - 2023

The City of Cortland Service Department will conduct branch and limb pick up service along city streets starting in April and continuing through October. Pick-up for the entire city is the week of the 4th Monday of each month. There will be one pick-up per month per household. The service day may vary during the collection week due to weather and workload. As noted below, branches should be placed at the curb no later than the Sunday prior to collection week to ensure removal. One pass will be made on each street.

### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

- Branches and limbs need to be placed at the curb no later than the Sunday before the scheduled collection week.
- One pass will be made on each street.
- Only branches and limbs will be picked up (trimmed/pruned & root-free).

- The City of Cortland Service Branches and limbs must be no Department will conduct branch and limb pick up service along city streets 4" in diameter.
  - The city will pick up a single brush pile no larger than 6′ x 8′ per household.
  - Do not combine piles with your neighbors.
  - Branches and limbs must be stacked in a straight pile with cut ends facing the street.
  - No firewood, large logs or complete trees will be picked up.



### **Medicare and Diabetes**

Do you have Medicare Insurance and need diabetic supplies, medication and services? Depending on the type of supplies, medications or services Original Medicare will cover these under either Part B or Part D of your coverage. In addition, if you have a Medicare Supplement policy it may pay towards the costs that Medicare does not cover. If you have a Medicare Advantage Plan, that plan must give you at a minimum the same coverage that Original Medicare would provide, but the plan may have different rules as to where you receive supplies & services and how much it costs.

Costs can be incurred though copayments/coinsurance or deductibles. Coinsurance, also called a copayment, is an amount you may be required to pay as your share of the cost for services after you pay any deductibles. Coinsurance is usually a percentage or a set amount you are responsible to pay for the service or supplies. For example, 20% of the costs of needed supplies or a \$35 set copay for a specialist visit. A Deductible is the amount you must pay for health care or prescriptions before the plan will begin to pay.

Diabetic medications and supplies are either covered under Part B or Part D of Medicare Insurance. Generally, Part B Medical Insurance, covers diabetic supplies including self-testing equipment and supplies (lancets & test

strips), insulin pumps and other items such as therapeutic shoes or inserts. Also covered under Part B are the medical costs associated with screening and treating diabetes along with the conditions that diabetes can cause. Medical costs can include screenings bloodwork, self-management training, and nutrition therapy services. Other covered services could include foot exams and treatment, glaucoma tests, some vaccines and preventive (well care) doctor visits.

Medicare Part D, prescription drug coverage, covers medications associated with the treatment of diabetes. These could include Insulin for injection along with the syringes, needles, alcohol swabs and other supplies to administer insulin and anti-diabetic drugs to maintain blood sugar (glucose) levels. When choosing a Part D prescription drug plan, it is important to look at the costs of your specific medications and compare pricing on different plans as formulary tiers and deductibles/copays can vary from company to company and plan to plan within each company. The insulin savings program that is now in effect limits the costs you can be charged for some insulins to \$35 per month. The specific insulins that fall under this program also vary from plan to plan making the need to research options and plans important.

For more information Medicare.gov or speak with your insurance agent. Your insurance agent should be able to explain the benefits and coverages associated with your policy and compare options in your local area to find the best option for your specific situation.



While I never gave her grandchildren, she had more kids calling her Grandma than any woman her age ever had. She was artistic and creative and was always crafting something. She was a decent artist, she studied tailoring and clothing design in New York City, she designed toys and dolls and was just always busy with something or other. However, she could not cook.
