#### **Memorial Day Program**

#### 2022 Drinking Water Consumer Confidence Report (CCR)

The City's annual Drinking Water Consumer Confidence Report is now available. The Ohio EPA requires the city to make available to all water consumers by July 1st of every year, the results of the previous year's testing. The CCR is mailed in the water bills and can also be accessed on our city website. The City of Cortland receives its drinking water from seven wells. Four of these wells are in Willow Park, two wells are on the property behind City Hall, and the 7th well is off of Bradley Brownlee Road. Our water comes from a limestone aquifer which is approximately 300 feet deep. The only treatment the city performs is fluoridation and chlorination.

#### **Brush Pickup**

Brush pickup will be the week of May 22nd this month. This free service is the 4th Monday of each month, April through October. Our chipper cannot handle branches more than 4" in diameter and our truck will only make one pass per street. Please see our website for full rules and regulations of this policy. cityofcortland.org

#### **Mosquito Spraying**

Mosquito spraying is performed to control and reduce the number of mosquitoes that can spread viruses. The schedule has been set for every other Wednesday, 7:00 p.m. to midnight, weather permitting. For effective mosquito control, it must not be raining, the winds need to be between 5 to 10 miles per hour and the temperature above 50 degrees. If the proper conditions are not present, the spraying will be cancelled and a make-up date will be for the following evening. The next spray is scheduled

#### Answer: D. Yes, But.....

I know what you're saying there is always a but! However, the answer to the question is a bit more complex than a simple, yes. Let's start with some background. Prior to the new law in Ohio, it was legal to purchase fireworks, if you transported them out of the state to set them off. This all changed as of July 1, 2022.

From that point on it is legal to discharge 1.4G consumer fireworks in Ohio on certain days UNLESS the relevant political subdivision has chosen to ban their use. Please take note that there are limitations on dates and times. • July 3, 4, and 5, and the Friday, Saturday, and Sunday immediately before and after July 4th (4 p.m.-11 p.m.) • Labor Day weekend (4 p.m.-11 p.m.) [1st Monday of September and the Saturday and Sunday immediately preceding that Monday]

• Diwali (4 p.m.-11 p.m.)

• New Year's Eve (4 p.m.-11:59 p.m.) • New Year's Day (12 a.m.-1 a.m.; 4 p.m.-11 p.m.)

- Chinese New Year (4 p.m.-11 p.m.)
- Cinco de Mayo (4 p.m.-11 p.m.)

• Memorial Day weekend (4 p.m.-11 p.m.) [last Monday is May and the Saturday and Sunday immediately preceding that Monday]

Juneteenth (4 p.m.-11 p.m.) [June 19] Therefore, it is only permissible on the dates and during the times listed. All other discharge of fireworks is still prohibited. It is also limited to 1.4G consumer grade fireworks. In order to set off 1.3G grade explosives you must be licensed and insured to do so, and all displays must have prior approval of the fire and police departments. More






If you follow our Facebook or City Council meetings, then you should be aware of our new hires. This month we would like to introduce you to one of our newest fulltime employees but feel that it is best done in her own words.

Hello, my name is Sophia Minor, and I would like to take a minute to introduce myself. I am a 22-year-old Firefighter/Paramedic, recently hired fulltime at the Cortland City Fire Department. Let me go back and start from the beginning.

I was born in Warren, Ohio, and have lived in the small town of Kinsman my entire life with my parents and 3 sisters. Growing up, I enjoyed outdoor activities, especially running and biking. I also enjoyed playing guitar and spending time with my friends and family. I was homeschooled and graduated from Abeka Academy in 2018. I started working at my first job, Pitmark Services Inc. in Kinsman, after finishing high school. Here I sorted and assembled different products for customers such as Kraftmaid.

## **Trumbull County MetroParks Board**

At a recent Board meeting the Trumbull County MetroParks Board approved a new mission, vision and core values for the Park District. This was discussed at a retreat on April 22, 2023, that was lead by Sarah Lowry. The new Mission statement is:

The mission of the Trumbull County MetroParks is to promote health, recreation, conservation, and economic development for residents and visitors by developing, preserving, and managing park properties.

#### **Excuse Our Mess!**

The City of Cortland currently has two simultaneous paving projects. Shelly & Sands is currently completing Mecca St (St Rt 46) Resurfacing & Intersection Improvement Upgrades. The area has been ground and has an intermediate course of asphalt on it. The finish course of asphalt is tentatively planned to be paved May 20, 2023, weather permitting.

Shelly and Sands is also doing our Annual Asphalt Resurfacing for 2022 - Erie St, Pearl St, Gates St, Market St, Orchard Ln, Tessa Pl, Maple Ave. (Orchard Ln to S Colonial Dr), Denman Ave, Elm Cr, Kean Dr, and Sunset Dr. We delayed paving to see if the pricing would come down, which it did!

In June, the city will be crack sealing for about two (2) weeks. This process also helps to extend the life of the asphalt.

There will be a break in paving until late summer/fall, when we begin our 2023 Annual Asphalt Resurfacing project - Dennis Dr, Diamond Way (Fowler St to Gemwae Dr), Stahl Ave, Viets Dr, and Winter Ln.

The City Service Department evaluates our roadways yearly. We do have a maintenance plan, where main thoroughfares are paved every 10-12 years. Lesser traveled roads will be paved every 10-15 years or more. We try to pave the city in one or two sections to get the best price. Market conditions and the price of asphalt may cause the schedule to vary.

The city is very proud of the high level of maintenance we provide to our residents and businesses in a costeffective manner.



#### **Pawsitivity** Spay/Neuter Your Pets, Part 1

heard some stories of pet owners experiencing surprise litter of kittens or puppies from their pets. Because of so important to spay/neuter cats and this, I've decided to focus this issue on one crucial aspect of responsible pet ownership - spaying and neutering your pets!

What is spay/neuter? Spay/neuter is a sterilization surgery performed on an animal to prevent them from reproducing. In male cats and dogs, the neuter surgery involves removing the testes. In female cats and dogs, spay surgery removes the ovaries or both the ovaries and uterus. The surgery is performed under anesthesia and pain management injections/medications are typically provided for recovery. We sometimes refer to a pet that has been spayed or neutered as "fixed."

Why is it important? Spay/neuter is important because it's the most effective way to combat the immense overpopulation problem. It's estimated that over 1.5 million perfectly healthy, adoptable pets are euthanized in U.S. animal shelters each year.

While we can raise the demand for adoption by ensuring pet ownership is affordable, encourage people to adopt rather than buy from a breeder, and support legislation that gives renters the right to keep a pet in their home, this can't close the gap on the number of pets that need homes versus the number of people who can adopt them.

Cats and dogs have frequent, large litters. Each year, female cats can have 2-3 litters of kittens with an average of 4-6 kittens per litter. Kittens can get pregnant at just 4 months old! Therefore, it's estimated that 2 cats (an unaltered male and female) and their litters can produce around 4,948 kittens born in just 7 years!

Female dogs can usually have 2 litters of puppies each year, with an average litter size of 6-10 puppies. Puppies can become pregnant at just 4-6 months old. This means that in just 7 years, 2 dogs (an unaltered male and



Life choices involve sacrifices, and sacrifices are part of character making. It's not if we sacrifice, but the kind of sacrifice made. When we're torn between taking on another shift when we need the money or keeping a promise to a friend, a sacrifice is being made. But we trust Him in our pursuit of our dreams. If our dream costs us our character, it's too high a cost. But if it doesn't, I pray you achieve that dream; we need more dreamers, not less, for our world to be great.


The starting point to these things is having a fear or reverence of the Lord, this is where the beginning of knowledge can be found. When you know Him as Lord and Savior of your







## **American Legion Post 540 102nd Anniversary**

American Legion Post 540, the Cortland, Bazetta, Mecca Post celebrated its 102nd Anniversary on March 12, 2023. The Post was named in honor of Raymond L. Johnson, who grew up in Greene, Ohio. In May 1917, he enlisted in the Ohio National Guard and joined the famous Ohio 37th Infantry Division that deployed to France. He was wounded in the Argonne battle, passed away in France, and was interred in the Greene, Ohio cemetery with full military honors.

Very early Post 540 meetings were held on a rotational basis around the area. Most were held in the Cortland Town Hall, but many took place in Mecca, Bazetta, North Bloomfield and Bristolville in private homes. Over the years several different buildings were owned on Main and South High Streets. The Post now meets every 4th Tuesday of the month, at 6 pm, in the Optimist Club building in Bazetta.

The Post participates in Veterans and Memorial Day programs in local schools and provides the Last Salute at about 75 veterans funerals each year. Scholarships are provided annually to eight Lakeview graduating seniors. Substantial donations are made to Bazetta/Cortland fire, police and rescue squads for needed equipment not in the budget. Each year veterans' graves at 4 area cemeteries are decorated with US flags for Memorial Day. And the list goes on.

Several years ago, while placing flags on graves at Hillside Cemetery for Memorial Day, I broke through a wall of bushes surrounding the flagpole. At the base of the pole I found a long forgotten stone memorial with a brass plate. Two artillery shell casings with flaking paint flanked the stone. On the stone and flagpole was inscribed "Donated by Post 540 in Memory of Technical Sergeant Lavern A. Weir. Tech 5". Weir grew up on Bazetta Road and deployed to the Philippine Islands in October 1941 with the 192nd Tank Battalion. The battalion was on Bataan when all US forces surrendered on 9 April 1942. Tech 5 Weir along with 60 to 80,000 US military and Filipinos were force marched 65 miles to Camp O'Donnell as part of the infamous Bataan Death March. He passed away while imprisoned in May 1942 with his remains being returned to Cortland in 1948. He and his wife Gladys are buried in Hillside cemetery. 
