

Fireworks

July 4th is famous for fireworks in our country. Fireworks have been used to celebrate the adoption of the Declaration of Independence on July 4th since 1777. Fireworks have been fascinating!

In 200 B.C. in Ancient China, bamboo was used for early communication. People would carve words on the hollow bamboo and dry it in the fire. On occasion, these early scrolls were left too long and would explode with a loud bang. Apparently, there were some unsavory "giant" mountain men in Ancient China and the loud bangs the exploding bamboo created scared them away, so bamboo segments were then exploded purposely in outdoor fires. These "giants" were really only 6.5 feet tall, but the average person in China then was usually around 5.5 feet tall.

In the year 600, Chinese medicine men were attempting to develop a magic elixir for immortality, and they accidentally (and ironically) created gunpowder. Gunpowder was then

added to the original bamboo segments and tossed into fires, and the resulting loud booms (now improved with orange sparks) were used to celebrate weddings, deaths and births (but not in that order).

In 1295, Marco Polo brought fireworks to Europe for the first time, with his other treasures (and a fun swimming game). In 1486, England had a booming where 'firemasters' (pyrotechnicians) and their green men (named for the green leaf hats they wore to protect them from burns), were tasked with celebratory firework displays (which were in paper tubes instead of bamboo by then).

In 1830, Italians invented the aerial shell and began adding different metals to create the color combinations we marvel at now, and if they hadn't, we might still only have orange! Barium is used for green, copper for blue,



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


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A 4th Of July Picnic - Eleanor Style



So they gave their bank account with over \$2,000 to another wonderful group, The Four Seasons Garden Club. Among the numerous projects the Garden Club does to keep our area


beautiful are the downtown flowers and

SONS OF HOPE

On July 4, 2014, I did not watch fireworks. I was in Tallinn, Estonia. Before my trip, I read about the struggles of the people to maintain their national identity during 70 years of Soviet occupation and eventually regain their independence.

But to be there in person was eye-

Most Estonians are not Christians. Christianity in several forms was introduced to them by various conquerors throughout their history, but it was never something that they universally embraced as their own. As was true of other things that are now commonplace in their culture, it is never truly theirs. Some have kept it, but most do not claim or love it.

What they do claim is what helped them to resist their decades of oppression: their music.

On July 3 of that year, I was present at their national song festival. The program was designed to let the choir of over 20,000 voices sing their way through their history, including their darker chapters. And when the program reached the 1950's, there was a moment of silence to honor the oppression they had suffered and the way they had been forbidden to sing

their own songs in public. The choir and the crowd of nearly 100,000 stood in absolute silence for a full minute. And in that moment, surrounded by their silence, as I remembered what I had read of their history and the way they eventually won by refusing to stop singing their own songs, I understood something important about God. Their silence, their song, their resolve - these were the work of God among a people who did not identify as Christian, but God was present with them. Their love for their country fueled them but did not cause them to become violent. Instead, it galvanized them to stand firm and lift their voices together. They sang. They stood shoulder to shoulder, refusing to move or yield, and they sang. And their songs, their courage, and their belief in their own identity were strong enough to outlast the Soviet Union.

I experienced a form of patriotism on that trip that I have seldom encountered here, but I will never forget it. In their resolve, in their love for their country, and in the songs they sang and the silence they kept together, I felt the presence of God.

Through our songs, may God inspire in us a peaceful patriotism like theirs.

Can I Change My Medicare Supplement Plan?

Medicare Supplement Insurance, also called Medigap Insurance, works as a secondary insurance to original Medicare Insurance. These policies do not replace original Medicare Insurance but work with it to cover the costs you are responsible for after Medicare has paid their part. There are several different options available. These plans are identified by letters, for example Plan G or Plan N. They are offered by many different insurance companies, but each specific plan is required to offer the same core benefits. Each insurance company individually determines the premium rate they will charge for the policy, the timetable for increases to premiums, and any underwriting conditions if you are not in a guaranteed issue situation.

ndividual insurance companies will determine the initial monthly premium for each Medicare Supplement Plan they offer. Once an individual is enrolled in the plan there are typically annual increases to the premium. The amount, frequency and timing of this increase is dictated by the insurance company. In addition, there may be increases in monthly premiums as policy holders get older. As these premiums increase, you may want to consider changing to a different Medicare Supplement Plan or to a different insurance company if they offer a lower rate.

In most cases Medicare Supplement Insurance is guaranteed acceptance at age 65 when first starting Medicare or during the first 6 months you are enrolled in Part B of Medicare if you delay Part B. There are a few other specific situations where a policy could be issued without questions. Each state has its own rules regarding open enrollment and guaranteed issue. If you are outside the open enrollment period and do not qualify for guaranteed issue, you can change plans at any time, but the application will be subject to

underwriting. Each insurance company has its own underwriting criteria, and the health questions will vary from company to company. As part of the application and underwriting process medical records are reviewed. If there are no issues, the new policy will typically be issued at the current rates for that company and plan. If you do have health conditions that are flagged during underwriting, the policy may be issued at the standard rate, issued at an increased rate or it may be declined.

It is important to keep your current Laptops, Tablets, iPads and Computers. coverage in place while exploring other options. Your current Medicare Supplement Insurance policy cannot be cancelled if you continue to pay the premiums. Once a new policy is approved, in place and paid for then the original policy can be cancelled. This provides continuous coverage and protection in case the new policy is not approved, or the premiums are higher than expected due to the underwriting

If premiums on the Medicare Supplement Insurance policy become too high and unaffordable, another option is to consider switching to a Medicare Advantage Insurance Plan (Part C). This can be done during Medicare's Annual Enrollment Period each fall or throughout the year if you qualify for a Special Enrollment Period. However, it is important to review the current available plans and basic coverage differences between Supplement Insurance and an Advantage Plan before making this decision. It is always helpful to consult your local agent. They can answer questions and look at the different options for your specific situation.

He said his name was Father Carl; Very early that was his wish! But for some silly reason -The name that stuck was Father Kish!


It's true we all love humor -Each of us enjoy a good chuckle! At this, Father Kish is a true champion! He could almost pop open your buckle!

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Understand Your Financial Situation Before Cosigning Your Child's Loan

As your child heads off to college or starts life as an independent young adult, he or she will likely face new financial responsibilities, such as a car purchase, rent or college tuition payments. Given their lack of credit history, it may be difficult for them to obtain a loan without a parent or another adult cosigning the loan. Your natural inclination may be to help them out and sign the dotted line, but before you do, make sure you're clear on the terms of the loan and what it may mean for your finances.

Cosign with your eyes wide open

Even though you may not consider it "your loan" if you cosign, lenders will identify you as one of the borrowers. That means you may be at risk if different circumstances arise. Keep in mind:

- If any of the balance remains unpaid by the borrower (in this scenario, your child), you as the cosigner will be required to repay it.
- If your child defaults or even misses one or two payments, it can damage your credit record.
- Even without a default, other lenders may look on the cosigned loan as an additional liability you will need to pay, which could also affect your credit record.
- In some states, the creditor has the right to collect payment from you, as the cosigner, without first trying to collect from your child
- If you were to pass away, it could trigger "auto default" provisions in the loan contract. This would require your child to immediately pay the debt. Regulators discourage this practice, but it still exists in some loan agreements.

Steps to protect your position

Fortunately, there are often alternatives to cosigning a loan. For example, if your child is enrolled in college, they may be eligible for federal student loans or financial aid. Another option, if you can afford it, may be to lend your child money directly –

thereby forgoing the paperwork and stipulations introduced by a third-party lender. If you decide to take this action, make sure you and your child have a clear and consistent understanding of the terms of the loan, including a repayment schedule that he or she will be accountable for sticking to.

If you do decide to cosign a loan, take steps to help protect yourself:

- Read the fine print and fully understand the terms of the loan and the expectations of the lender.
- Avoid pledging property, such as a car, to secure the loans as it could create additional risk.
- Arrange to receive duplicate copies of all paperwork and ensure you have complete online access to the account so you can stay on top of your child's record of repayment.

In short, treat the situation with the same diligence that you would if you were borrowing money yourself. Do what you can to ensure sure your potential act of generosity doesn't impair your ability to obtain credit in the future

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Why It's Important to Control an Aggressive Dog

Pawsitivity Part 1: "Free" Kittens / Puppies

Hello - it's me, Pawsitivity! I've seen so many Facebook posts/yard signs/ newspaper listings this year advertising free kittens and puppies.

Sometimes the owner will say something along the lines of "momma wasn't spayed and here we are - can't keep the extra kittens/puppies, so we're giving them away!" I talked about the importance of practicing responsible pet ownership by spaying/neutering your pet in the last two articles, which is the best way to prevent this situation. But in this issue, I'm going to focus on why it's a problem to offer kittens/ puppies for free!

Why not offer kittens/puppies for free? When someone invests in (pays for) a pet, they're more likely to take care of it! On the flipside, people tend not to value what they don't pay for. Besides, people who can get a pet for free may not have the money to care for them in the first place. Pet ownership has always been costly, but it's gotten way more expensive!

The ASPCA estimates that the cost to care for a cat is approximately \$52 per month. The average cost to own a dog is \$43 - \$90 per month (depending on the size). If someone can't even afford to pay a rehoming fee, they certainly can't afford to feed and get veterinary care tor the pet.

Lastly, some people look for free animals to do horrible (and illegal) things to. They torture them, use them as bait, food for other pets, etc. This is probably the most important reason not to give kittens/puppies away for free since they can suffer at the hands of an abuser before being subjected to a cruel death.

If you've put yourself in a position where you have kittens/puppies that now require a home, make sure it's a good one with people who will value the pet, have the resources to care for it, and are genuinely interested in responsible pet ownership.

Get the pet spayed/neutered prior to sending them to their new home to ensure they won't continue to breed. Ensure you ask for a "rehoming fee" to deter people who don't have the pet's best interest at heart. Encourage other people you see giving pets away for free to (at minimum) ask for a rehoming fee. This fee can help you cover the cost of the spay/neuter surgery for the future owner, too!

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






Local Woman's Dress On Display At Henry Ford Museum

been in an exhibit. The first time was an online exhibit in August a few years ago for the start of school. She received this email from the curator of domestic life at the Henry Ford Museum last week.



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
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


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
