Part 2: "Free" Kittens / Puppies (Spoiler Alert: They're NOT free!)

Hello, hope you're having a this procedure, though! great summer! It's Pawsitivity here to continue the conversation about why it's NOT free to take someone up on the tempting offer for a "free" kitten or puppy!

Why aren't "free" kittens/puppies free? When you adopt from a shelter, you're likely getting a pet that's fully upto-date on vaccines, parasite treatments, and spayed/neutered.

In exchange, you pay an adoption fee. This fee doesn't even begin to cover the shelter's costs of rehabilitating/ rescuing that animal. For kittens, the local adoption fee is usually \$70 to \$130 depending on the rescue. For puppies, this fee is typically between \$200 to \$250. Note: Adoption fees for adult cats/dogs are typically much lower.

These costs might seem high, but spay/neuter costs alone are expensive! For a kitten, even the low-cost spay/ neuter clinics charge about \$100 for the surgery. Puppies are even more expensive - \$150 to \$250 to spay/neuter them at a low-cost clinic. Your regular veterinarian may charge up to \$500 for

As an added benefit, adoption centers treat pets for parasites with prescription-strength solutions. This solution will rid them of intestinal worms, fleas, ticks, heartworm, lice, mites, etc. before they can bring these unwanted pests home to you!

In addition, pets from a shelter are fully vaccinated, usually free from infection, and protected against an array of future health-complications thanks to vaccines. Bonus: Your pet may also come with a microchip that can be scanned in

People who hope to accomplish big goals need this healthy rhythm for success and stamina.

I will be doing a series of articles over the next few weeks explaining what Heritage Ohio is, the results of the DART assessment, and how we move forward. Heritage Ohio is part of the national "Main Street America" network and administers the Ohio Main Street program. Initially based in historic preservation, the Main Street approach was developed by the National Trust for Historic Preservation to save historic commercial architecture and the fabric of American communities. However, it has become a powerful economic development tool as well.

Main Street America both nationally and in Ohio have proven track records. Main Street America has been helping revitalize older and historic commercial districts since 1980. During that time, they accomplished:

- \$101.58 billion reinvested
- 325,119 buildings rehabilitated
- 746,897 jobs created
- 163,693 businesses started

From 1998-2022, Ohio Main Street has realized:

- \$1.9 billion private investment
- \$391 million public investment
- 6151 Full time jobs and 5888 part time jobs created
 - 1,656 new businesses
- With over 1 million volunteer hours donated

Currently Ohio Main Street has 21 Ohio Main Street Program Communities Downtown Communities who are just beginning the program. It is a VOLUNTEER program, not a City program. It will eventually become a 501c3.





Entering Retirement Solo? Here are Tips for Managing Your Finances as You Grow Older

Approximately 23 million Americans ages 65 and older are single, divorced or widowed, according to the most recent data available from the U.S. Census Bureau.1 That means there are many people in this country who are planning their retirement on their own, without the help of a spouse or partner.

Medicare Insurance For Self Employed Individuals And Small Businesses

employee of a small business, it is important to understand your options with Medicare Insurance when you turn 65 or otherwise become eligible for Medicare. If you are utilizing the Affordable Care Act (Obamacare) and receiving a premium subsidy, have an individual insurance plan or are part of a small group plan with an employer that has less than 20 employees you will need to sign up for Medicare when you turn 65 to avoid possible penalties for late enrollment later. In addition, if you continue in a plan with your employer that is considered credible coverage but has less than 20 employee members, Medicare Insurance becomes the primary payer of claims and the group insurance is secondary. If you do not enroll in Medicare, you may be responsible for paying medical costs yourself as the employer plan will process and pay claims as if you are enrolled in Medicare Insurance.

For those who have insurance through COBRA or other short term individual plans, Medicare does not consider these plans "credible coverage". Therefore, if you delay signing up for Medicare Parts A, B and D, you may incur monthly penalties on the premiums owed when you do sign up. If you have a plan through the Affordable Care Act Marketplace there may be tax consequences for premium subsidies received through the marketplace after turning 65 or otherwise becoming eligible for Medicare Insurance.

If you or your spouse continue to work past age 65 and are covered by an employer group insurance plan with 20 or more employees, the group insurance remains the primary payer, and it is not necessary to sign up for Medicare until you lose that coverage. However, most beneficiaries will qualify for premium

If you are self employed or an free Part A, hospital coverage. Signing up for Part A does not cost anything and starts the Medicare process. It may be helpful to talk to a licensed insurance agent familiar specifically with Medicare Insurance and the different rules and regulations. It is also a good idea to consider employer insurance costs compared to Medicare Insurance costs. Many times, Medicare Insurance when added to a Medicare Supplement or Medicare Advantage plan will have lower overall costs when you consider premiums, deductibles, copays, and maximum out of pockets costs compared to individual and group insurance plans.



THANK YOU - I would like to say a big "THANK YOU" to Service Director, Kim Blasco, for guiding the city through the recent huge Mecca intersection improvement project! Kim's cost containment measures allowed this \$1.2 million project to remain on budget, which is astounding considering the current price of materials.

I would be remiss not to thank former Service Director, Don Wittman, also, who started this project around 2015 with a traffic study conducted by GPD, preparing for additional traffic for the then yet-to- be-built new K-8 building.

This project solved not only traffic problems but drainage problems as well. Only the thermoplastic striping is yet to be performed, and then the project will actually be complete!

Traffic Changes - As part of an overall and ongoing evaluation of traffic patterns within the city, two noticeable changes residents will see is the posted speed limit on West Main St. in the business district and the "NO TURN ON RED" designation on SR 5 at SR 46. The posted speed limit on West Main St. has been increased from 20 MPH to 25 MPH to be in compliance with Ohio law. At SR 5 and SR 46 the continuous right turn on red when going northbound has been changed to "NO TURN ON RED" to improve the safety of the intersection when Warren Meadville drivers have a green light. Because of added actuators, motorists will find the period of time they actually sit at the red light is minimal. Cortland Police will begin increasing traffic enforcement throughout the city, so please drive safe




